



New Fire Science Certification Partnerships

A memorandum of understanding (MOU) was signed on August 26 between Garden City Community College and Colby Community College administrators. This created a partnership between the two colleges allowing GCCC to provide instruction and certifications for Fire Science within the Colby area and to local fire departments to develop a Fire Science pathway. Similar agreements were also signed with Dodge City Community College, Seward County Community College, and Northwest Technical College (Goodland).





GCCC Track & Cross Country Team Hosts Color Run

The GCCC Track & Cross Country teams invited the community to join them in a Color Run on September 21 at the Lee Richardson Zoo. Many students, staff, and community members joined in on the fun! The event served as a fundraiser for the Track & Cross Country teams.

32nd Annual Hispanic Student Day

The Garden City Community College Hispanic American Leadership Organization (H.A.L.O) and GCCC Student Support Services (SSS) hosted the 32nd Annual Hispanic Student Day on Friday, October 4. This unique and special opportunity allowed area high school students to become familiar with the GCCC campus, meet H.A.L.O. members and staff, and learn about college processes.





GCCC Top 50 Schools for Transfer Success

Garden City Community College was named one of Student Loan Hero's top 50 schools in the country for successful transfer from community college to four-year university. The rankings were based on transfer-out and graduation rates of students attending two-year schools.

GCCC Boasts #1 Practical Nursing Program in Kansas

Garden City Community College boasted the number one practical nursing program in the state, according to a national group dedicated to championing the growth and professional advancement of nurses nationwide. The 2019 study from Practicalnursing.org, ranked 17 Kansas schools overall, and put GCCC at the top of the list based on the number of GCCC practical nursing students who passed their national standardized test on the first try.





Bronchuster Esports team Created; Wins 2nd Place National Title

GCCC joined the ranks of 29 other two-year schools across the country to host its very own esports team. Led by GCCC's David Larsen from the IT Department, this group competes in video game competitions. The team finished its inaugural season as the National Runner-up.

GCCC Earns Workplace Award

The National Institute for Staff and Organization Development and Diverse Issues in Higher Education selected Garden City Community College as a "2020 Promising Places to Work in Community Colleges" award recipient for the second consecutive year. Despite the challenges brought on by the pandemic, GCCC employees persevered and found innovative methods to serve students in an era of social distancing and continued to carry out GCCC's mission while putting community health and safety first.





GCCC Hosts Annual Exploration Day

Garden City Community College hosted its annual Exploration Day on November 13. Area high school juniors and seniors were invited to the community college campus to explore various fields of study and discover opportunities that GCCC provides.

New Carpentry Program Developed

Garden City Community College developed a new carpentry program for the Fall of 2020. This new 18-credit hour program was designed to be completed in one semester to ensure quick entry into the workforce and assist with fulfilling area workforce needs in the construction industry.





New Board of Trustee Members Sworn In

Newly elected board members, Beth Tedrow, Shanda Smith and David Rupp were sworn in by President, Dr. Ryan Ruda at the December 10 board meeting. The new Trustee's official first day of office was January 13, 2020. Trustees are elected and serve a 4-year term.

Regular meetings of the Garden City Community College Board of Trustees are conducted on the second Tuesday of each month, on campus, generally in the Endowment Room at the Beth Tedrow Student Center.

GCCC Hosts 8th Annual "Polar Plunge & Strut"

GCCC hosted the Plunge & Strut benefit for Special Olympics Kansas (SOKS), on February 29, 2020. More than 30 individuals pledged to "plunge" into the icy waters of a pool in the Dennis Perryman Athletic Complex on the GCCC Campus. The Plunge also featured a family friendly 5K Polar Strut. The money raised from the event helped fund equipment, year-round sports training and competition, health programs, and leadership classes for SOKS athletes.



"Unprecedented Times" Closed Campus

During the March 2020, the novel coronavirus (Covid-19) infections soared and in response, Garden City Community College closed its campus in order to combat the spread. The NJCAA cancelled all spring athletics. Health and safety of students, employees, and the community was the top priority during this unprecedented time. Students transitioned to online distance learning and many employees worked from home for the remainder of the semester.

"Transfer Connect" Partnership with FHSU

On April 20th, the Transfer Connect partnership between GCCC and Fort Hays State University went live. Transfer Connect is a dual advising relationship where a prospective community college student has access to an FHSU Transfer Success Coach, who proactively engages with their assigned students. This coordination begins much earlier than in traditional advisement to ensure smooth transferability of a student's community college work. More GCCC students transfer to FHSU to continue their studies annually than any other four-year institution statewide.





Free Student Laptops from CARES Act

In May 2020, GCCC was able to offer 150 laptops to students in need through funding from the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act and the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF). Since classes were forced to move to distance/online learning, many students needed reliable equipment and GCCC was proud to offer assistance to those who qualified.

The New Normal

When it was safe to reopen campus in late summer, GCCC worked closely with the local health department to create strict health and safety guidelines. "At GCCC, the health and safety of the people who live, work, and study on our campus is our number one priority." Derek Ramos, Dean of Physical Planning, said. Preventive measures included mandating face masks on campus, rearranging classrooms to allow for social distancing, installing Plexiglas separators in various offices on campus, and increasing disinfection protocols. The welfare and safety of our students, faculty, staff, and our community remained paramount during these unprecedented times.








Garden City Community College, then known as Garden City Junior College, was one of the first four community colleges established in Kansas. GCCC opened its doors in September 1919 and since then has remained a premier educational nexus to progress, producing positive contributors to society.

Centennial Gala hosted by GCCC Endowment Association

The GCCC Endowment Association held a gala celebrating the 100th anniversary of GCCC on September 27th in the Beth Tedrow Student Center. This event included a social hour with a wine and ale bar, followed by a prime rib dinner. The GCCC Jazz ensemble performed for the guests.

100 Years of Community Parade

Saturday, September 28th saw a large parade take place on the GCCC campus. Various community organizations, businesses, and groups participated in the parade alongside floats by GCCC teams, divisions, and departments.

Family Fun Ed-Venture: Food, Scavenger Hunt, and Entertainment

Following the parade, GCCC hosted a free meal, a free family-friendly scavenger hunt event involving various campus departments and clubs, and entertainment from local radio stations and various performing groups. The Family Fun Ed-Venture scavenger hunt was enjoyed by community members and GCCC students and employees who completed Ed-Venture cards at departmental booths for a chance to win one of many prizes donated by generous community partners.

Time Capsule, Pep-Band Performance, and Homecoming Coronation

Dr. Ruda, GCCC President, placed items reflective of the 100th Anniversary into a GCCC Time Capsule during the celebration. Afterwards, the GCCC Pep-Band performed and lead the crowds in a march across campus to Bronchuster Stadium where the Homecoming Coronation took place.

Old Timer's Bowl/Homecoming Football Game

GCCC football team took on Fort Scott Community College during the 2019 Homecoming Football game. This game was dubbed the "Old-Timer's Bowl," recognizing that both GCCC and Fort Scott CC are celebrating 100th anniversaries. Garden City beat out Fort Scott, 42-16 and took home an "Old-Timer's Bowl" trophy.
































100th Graduation Held Virtually Amid COVID-19 Pandemic






