COMMENTS FROM THE CHAIR. Chair Worf called the regular session to order at 5:55 p.m., welcomed guests, and made comments, as follows:

- Filing deadline for the three spots on the Board of Trustees is January 23rd at 12 noon. The three members whose terms expire on June 30th are Steve Sterling, Terri Worf, and Lauren Welch. General Election will be held April 3rd.
- Congratulated Lucas Aslin on being named the new Head Football Coach and wished J J Eckert well as he moved back to Texas!
- Congratulated Dr. Clayton Tatro on successfully defending his thesis on December 14 and then graduating on December 15 and receiving his Ph.D. degree from Colorado State University!
- Congratulated the Class of 2006 Practical Nursing graduates for a 100% pass rate of the state licensure exam; congratulations also to the 25 CNA students who passed their certification exams!

OPEN COMMENTS FROM PUBLIC. Chair Worf stated that Rich Harp, President of Finney County Economic Development Corporation, wished to make a few comments about the special election to be held on April 3.

Harp distributed a brochure discussing FCEDC's plan to ask voters on April 3rd for authority to extend, for five years, a quarter-cent sales tax. He emphasized that the proposed tax is NOT a new tax; it is already in place and is now being used to fund highway improvements in Finney County (scheduled to sunset in March 2008). The sales tax extension would produce an estimated \$1.2 million per year, which would be invested in two things: (1) creating new primary jobs and (2) helping establish a competitive reserve of resources for existing business development and new business recruitment, including business incentives [low interest loans, property tax credits, grants], workforce training grants, higher wages for existing jobs, and marketing and promotion of Finney County.

Harp said that GCCC was a tremendous asset to the community and it was instrumental in the workforce training piece of economic development. He commended Carol Ballantyne and Ron Schwartz for their expertise and support of FCEDC. He encouraged trustees to support the election campaign by writing letters to the editor and/or being part of the speakers' bureau promoting the issue.

Chair Worf asked if Trustees wished to pull any items on the Consent Agenda for the purpose of discussion; consensus was to pull Item D. Approval of property and liability insurance premium for 2007 for discussion purposes.

MOTION: Schwartz moved, seconded by Sterling, that the remainder of the Consent Agenda items be approved. Motion carried 5-0.

APPROVAL OF PROPERTY AND LIABILITY INSURANCE PREMIUM FOR 2007

Trustees asked how the premium for 2007 in the amount of \$123,236 compared to last year's premium. Wigner stated that this amount was down about \$3,000 from last year.

Clifford moved, seconded by Schwartz, that the Board of Trustees approve the property liability insurance premium for 2007, as presented.

Keller Leopold Insurance, Inc. \$123,236 Motion carried 5-0.

POLICY REVIEW

MONITORING REPORTS and ENDS REPORT

Trustees indicated that they had received and reviewed the incidental informational reports and the monthly and annual monitoring reports (copy attached as a part of these minutes). Ballantyne indicated that she didn't get the quarterly report written because of illness, but would have it ready for next month's meeting; she would also include the CEO's interpretation and justification statements for the monthly and annual reports next month. Chair Worf noted that the monitoring reports were accepted as presented.

OWNERSHIP LINKAGE

Trustees reviewed two pieces of correspondence from owners expressing their appreciation: (1) for the Nursing Department, and (2) for supporting Downtown Vision activities (copies of correspondence attached as a part of these minutes).

Trustees said they continued to hear good things from the community about the college in general.

Trustees had previously received material from Chair Worf regarding a self-evaluation as well as a total Board evaluation. Brief discussion was held regarding pros and cons of the sample evaluation tools. Consensus was that this work should be done in a retreat format, and Trustees should look at their calendars and be ready at next month's meeting to set a retreat date, perhaps at the end of April.

REPORTS

PRESIDENT CAROL E. BALLANTYNE commented on the following:

- Trustees had previously received a copy of an article from a newspaper in North Carolina discussing how the economy affects community colleges and how community colleges can affect the economy
- Trustees had previously received a copy of the ISES report on deferred maintenance and capital renewal; \$8,300,692 was needed to repair GCCC's deficiencies; Ballantyne noted that administration would continue to study the report and make recommendations at a future meeting
- Trustees received a handout (copy attached as a part of these minutes) detailing the final accounting of the "Front Door Project." In short, the final construction costs were \$152,130 less than base bid plus change orders; this savings was attributed to early completion of the project. \$3.12 million in certificates of participation had been approved to fund the project, as well as spending some General Fund dollars. Ballantyne reported that not as much General Fund dollars were needed as originally expected, so that savings could be used on other projects, and she planned to make those recommendations at a future Board meeting.
- Ballantyne reported that the bids for the proposed fire tower had come in higher than anticipated, and the City would be working with the college on how to proceed from here
- Ballantyne said that the color copier in the print shop was getting older and costs for repair were getting higher. Staff was studying the situation and may look at leasing rather than purchasing; a recommendation would be made at a future Board meeting.

REPORT FROM FINNEY COUNTY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORP.

Trustees had previously received a copy of the question that would be on the April 3rd ballot regarding the proposed extension of the quarter-cent sales tax (copy attached as a part of these minutes). As a partner in the FCEDC, the college needed to approve the question.

Douglass moved, seconded by Clifford, that the Board of Trustees approve the ballot question, as presented. Motion carried 5-0.

SHALL THE FOLLOWING BE ADOPTED?

Shall Finney County, Kansas, impose a one-fourth of one percent (.25%) county-wide sales tax, pursuant to K.S.A. Sec. 12-187, *et seq.*, as amended, including specifically K.S.A. 12-187, to fund and operate a comprehensive economic development plan for the Finney County / Garden City /Holcomb, Kansas area, including but not limited to providing incentives to support both existing and new businesses that will create new jobs, all in accordance with the written economic development guidelines and policies adopted from time to time by the Finney County Economic Development Corporation and approved by the elected commissioners of Finney County, City of Garden City and City of Holcomb, said tax to be in effect for a period of five (5) years, commencing upon the expiration of the one-fourth of one percent (.25%) county-wide sales tax approved by voters at a November 2, 2004 election for highway system improvements?

OTHER

Dr. Clifford noted that he would be out of town on February 21st so he would miss the next meeting. Darla will check with the other Trustees to make sure there would be a quorum.

Trustees asked what GCCC was doing in light of the new city ordinance which prohibited smoking in public buildings and within fifty (50) feet of the primary public entrance or exit to public buildings. Ballantyne indicated that smoking had been prohibited in GCCC buildings for quite some time, and the Fiscal and Physical Committee was now in the process of determining what/where the "primary public entrances" were. In addition, we are researching what/where appropriate signage should be installed so the campus would be in compliance with the new city ordinance.

Trustees asked if GCCC actively recycled plastic bottles, etc. Ballantyne noted that at one time one of the student organizations was involved in a recycling project, but it ended up not being very reliable. Ballantyne acknowledged that the recycling idea was probably lower on the list of priorities than it should be, but we would check into it.

Articulation Agreement between the Department of Industrial Production Technology at Garden City Community College and the College of Technology and Aviation at Kansas State University at Salina

The Department of Industrial Production Technology at Garden City Community College (GCCC) and the College of Technology and Aviation at Kansas State University at Salina (KSU) agree to provide the courses listed on the attached transfer planning guide (Attachment I) as a joint two-plus-two program that will enable students to meet the requirements for the Associate of Science degree at GCCC and the Bachelor of Science degree in **Engineering Technology with an option in Mechanical Engineering Technology** at KSU.

The two institutions will each identify a liaison officer whose role will be to communicate with the other institution regarding procedures and requirements, curriculum matters, equivalent transfer credit, course equivalencies, course requirements, changes in personnel, and academic advisement as needed to operate the program. Written and telephone inquiries from students and staff of GCCC will be welcomed by the liaison officer at KSU, so that a student's questions can be answered prior to arrival at KSU.

The liaison officers from KSU and GCCC will meet periodically to discuss matters related to this agreement. One of the objectives of these meetings will be to endeavor to establish common syllabi and common textbooks for the courses accepted for transfer. Attachment I can be modified by mutual written consent by the respective deans of the two institutions.

Both colleges agree that all students who successfully complete the requirements for the courses listed in the attached transfer planning guide, and who have met other institutional requirements for the degrees, will be granted the specified degrees.

Both colleges agree to provide student support services including admissions, academic advising, library access, technical support and others services as needed and appropriate. The staffs at both colleges and their institutions will coordinate their student services to assure a smooth transition from one institution to the other.

GCCC agrees to make its students aware of the opportunities afforded by this articulation and will identify this articulation agreement in its catalog and related publications. GCCC also agrees to notify the KSU liaison officer of any changes that influence the program.

This agreement is subject to annual review by the departments and their institutions to determine whether or not this agreement should be modified or continued. It is not intended to confer enforceable rights on any third party.

Give a brief description of the current program (purpose and function):

The current Associate Degree Nursing Program prepares the students for entry into professional nursing. The practice of nursing covers a wide range of activities that may be viewed on a continuum beginning with simple nursing tasks progressing through increasingly complex responsibilities, and culminating in critical decision making activities. Upon graduation, the graduate is prepared to function in various health care settings in three interrelated roles: provider of care, manger of care and member of the profession. An Associate in Applied Science or Associate of Science degree is granted upon completion of the program, and the graduate is eligible to take the National Council Licensure Examination for licensure as a Registered Nurse (RN). In accordance with the Kansas Articulation Plan for Nursing Education, the graduate is eligible to articulate into a Bachelor of Science in Nursing Program. The Nursing department is continually evaluating program prerequisites and course requirements to meet industry standards and improve the learning environment.

Give a brief description of the revised program (purpose and function). How have the revised courses altered this program?

The proposed program will maintain the end result of graduating students who are prepared to function in various health care settings in three interrelated roles: provider of care, manger of care and member of the profession. The difference will be most evident in the first year in two ways.

- 1) The first year will be reconfigured to provide an option to take the National Council Licensure Examination to become a Licensed Practical Nurse at the end of the first year.
- 2) The large blocks of nursing classes will the redesigned to have less than 5 credit hours per course. In addition, the courses will be developed to reflect the work of the state core curriculum committee for practical nursing education.

What new competencies will be attained with this program revision?

The state core curriculum committee with the assistance of Dr. Ruth Davidhizer envisioned the competencies needed in the next decade for the graduate to function as a practical nurse. From this visioning workshop, the core curriculum committee began to write the curriculum. The major change was a focus in gerontology which is evident in the proposed curriculum for Garden City Community College Nursing Program.

The role and scope of the Licensed Practical Nurse is another added competency for the Associate Degree Nursing Program. Graduates of the proposed program with have a practicing knowledge of the tasks that can be delegated to the LPN and the responsibility of delegation.

 - Interpersonal Communications, Microbiology, Anatomy & Physiology and College Skills Development have been made prerequisite classes for the nursing program.
 - Interpersonal Communications provides the student with the skills they need to interact with a patient. This class facilitates the student's ability to interact and enter into a therapeutic nurse/patient relationship.
 - Microbiology provides a basis for knowledge regarding surgical and medical asepsis. This class also assists the students understanding of content presented in the pharmacology class.
 - Anatomy and Physiology II coincides and supports information taught in the first semester of the program. Requiring Anatomy and Physiology I as a prerequisite allows us to provide a logical sequence of courses that support and build on concepts common to both courses.
 - College Skills Development is a course that was designed to be taken early in a program to assist the student become acclimated in the college environment. The skills learned in this course will help the student become successful in future college classes.

GENERAL TERMS: The following terms apply to all lease transactions:

1. PRODUCTS. The term "Products" shall refer collectively to all equipment (the "Equipment"), software, and supplies ordered under this Agreement. You represent that the Products are being ordered for your own business use (rather than resale) and that they will not be used for personal, household or family purposes.

2. NON-CANCELABLE LEASE. THIS AGREEMENT IS A LEASE AND IT CANNOT BE CANCELED OR TERMINATED EXCEPT AS EXPRESSLY PROVIDED HEREIN, AND YOUR OBLIGATION TO MAKE ALL PAYMENTS DUE OR TO BECOME DUE SHALL BE ABSOLUTE AND UNCONDITIONAL AND SHALL NOT BE SUBJECT TO ANY DELAY, REDUCTION, SET-OFF, DEFENSE, COUNTERCLAIM OR RECOUPMENT FOR ANY REASON WHATSOEVER, IRRESPECTIVE OF XEROX'S PERFORMANCE OF ITS OBLIGATIONS HEREUNDER. ANY CLAIM AGAINST XEROX MAY BE ASSERTED SOLELY AGAINST XEROX IN A SEPARATE ACTION.

3. LEASE COMMENCEMENT, PAYMENT, TAXES & CREDIT HISTORY.

A. The lease term for this Agreement shall commence upon installation of the Equipment; provided, however, for customer-installable Equipment, the lease term for this Agreement shall commence upon delivery of the Equipment.

B. Invoices are payable upon receipt and you agree to pay Xerox each Minimum Lease Payment, all Print Charges and all other sums due as follows: (i) if the invoice displays a due date, payment is due and must be received by Xerox on or before said due date, or (ii) if the invoice does not display a due date, payment is due and must be received by Xerox no later than thirty (30) days after the invoice date. Restrictive covenants on instruments or documents submitted for or with payments you send to Xerox will not reduce your obligations.

C. You shall be responsible for any and all applicable Taxes, which will be included in Xerox's invoice unless you provide proof of your tax exempt status. "Taxes" shall mean any tax, assessment or charge imposed or collected by any governmental entity or any political subdivision thereof, however designated or levied, imposed on this Agreement or the amounts payable to Xerox by you for the billing of Products, Print Charges, services and maintenance of any kind; Taxes include, but are not limited to, sales and use, rental, excise, gross receipts and occupational or privilege taxes, plus any interest and/or penalty thereon, but excluding any personal property taxes and taxes on Xerox's net income. If a taxing authority determines that Xerox did not collect all applicable Taxes, you shall remain liable to Xerox for such additional Taxes.

D. You, to the extent required by applicable law, authorize Xerox (or its agent) to obtain credit reports, make such other credit inquiries as Xerox may deem necessary at any time, furnish payment history information to credit reporting agencies, and release to prospective assignees of this Agreement or any rights hereunder credit-related information Xerox has about you and this Agreement.

4. BASIC SERVICES. As a mandatory part of a lease, Xerox (or a designated servicer) will provide the following Basic Services under this Agreement (unless you are acquiring Equipment for which Xerox does not offer Basic Services; such Equipment to be designated as "No Svc."):

A. REPAIRS & PARTS. Xerox will make repairs and adjustments necessary to keep Equipment in good working order (including such repairs or adjustments required during initial installation). Parts required for repair may be new, reprocessed, or recovered.

B. HOURS & EXCLUSIONS. Unless otherwise stated, Basic Services will be provided during Xerox's standard working hours (excluding Xerox-recognized holidays) in areas within the United States, its territories, and possessions open for repair service for the Equipment at issue. You agree to give Xerox reasonable access to the Equipment. Basic Services shall cover repairs and adjustments required as a result of normal wear and tear or defects in materials or workmanship (and shall exclude repairs or adjustments Xerox determines to relate to or be affected by the use of options, accessories, or other connected products not serviced by Xerox, as well as any non-Xerox alterations, relocation, service, supplies, or consumables). You agree to use Equipment in accordance with, and to perform all operator maintenance procedures for Equipment as set forth in, the applicable manuals provided by Xerox.

C. INSTALLATION SITE & METER READINGS. The Equipment installation site must conform to Xerox's published requirements throughout the term of this Agreement. If applicable, you agree to provide meter readings in the manner prescribed by Xerox. If you do not provide Xerox with meter readings as required, Xerox may estimate them and bill you accordingly.

D. EQUIPMENT REPLACEMENT. If Xcrox is unable to maintain the Equipment as described above, Xcrox will, as your exclusive remedy for Xcrox's failure to provide Basic Services, replace the Equipment with an identical product or, at Xcrox's option, another product of equal or greater capabilities. If a replacement product is provided pursuant to this Section, there will not be an

additional charge for the replacement product and, except as set forth in the section of this Agreement titled "MAINTENANCE COMPONENT PRICE INCREASES", there will not be an additional charge for Basic Services during the then-current term during which Basic Services are being provided.

E. CARTRIDGE PRODUCTS. If Xerox is providing Basic Services for Equipment utilizing cartridges designated by Xerox as customer replaceable units, including copy/print cartridges and xerographic modules or fuser modules ("Cartridges"), you agree to use only unmodified Cartridges purchased directly from Xerox or its authorized resellers in the United States and the failure to use such Cartridges shall void any warranty applicable to such Equipment.

F. PC/WORKSTATION REQUIREMENTS. In order to receive Basic Services and/or Software Support for Equipment requiring connection to a PC or workstation, you must utilize a PC or workstation that either (1) has been provided by Xerox or (2) meets Xerox's published specifications.

G. DELIVERY AND REMOVAL. Xerox will be responsible for all standard delivery and removal charges. You will be responsible for any non-standard delivery or removal charges incurred.

5. WARRANTY DISCLAIMER & WAIVERS. XEROX DISCLAIMS, AND YOU WAIVE, THE IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF NON-INFRINGEMENT AND FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE. The parties intend this Agreement to be a "finance lease" under Article 2A of the Uniform Commercial Code. Except to the extent expressly provided, herein and to the extent permitted by applicable law, you waive all rights and remedies conferred upon a lessee by said Article.

6. INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY INDEMNITY. Xerox, at its expense, will defend you from, and pay any settlement agreed to by Xerox or any final judgment for, any claim that a Xerox-brand Product infringes a third party's U.S. intellectual property rights, provided you promptly notify Xerox of the alleged infringement and permit Xerox to direct the defense. Xerox is not responsible for any non-Xerox litigation expenses or settlements unless it preapproves them in writing. To avoid infringement, Xerox may modify or substitute an equivalent Xerox-brand Product, refund the price paid for the Xerox-brand Product (less the reasonable rental value for the period it was available to you), or obtain any necessary licenses. Xerox is not liable for any infringement-related liabilities outside the scope of this Section including, but not limited to, infringement based upon a Xerox-brand Product being modified to your specifications or being used or sold with products not provided by Xerox.

7. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY. Xerox shall not be liable to you for any direct damages in excess of \$10,000 or the amounts paid hereunder, whichever is greater, and neither party shall be liable to the other for any special, indirect, incidental, consequential or punitive damages arising out of or relating to this Agreement, whether the claim alleges tortious conduct (including negligence) or any other legal theory. The above-stated limitation of liability shall not be applicable to any specific indemnification obligations set forth in this Agreement. Any action you take against Xerox must be commenced within two (2) years after the event that caused it.

8. ASSIGNMENT.

A. If you wish to assign any rights or obligations under this Agreement, you shall provide a written notice to Xerox of such request for consent, with said notice including the name of the proposed assignee. Your request to assign this Agreement will be granted by Xerox if: (1) you are not in default under this Agreement or any other agreement with Xerox; (2) the proposed assignee agrees to the section of this Agreement titled "LEASE COMMENCEMENT, PAYMENT, TAXES & CREDIT HISTORY" as applicable to it, for the purposes of the proposed assignment; (3) the proposed assignee meets Xerox's then current credit criteria for similar transactions as determined by Xerox in its sole discretion; and, (4) you and the proposed assignment. Assignment by you requires the written consent of Xerox and may not be accomplished by operation of law.

B. Xerox may assign this Agreement, in whole or in part, to a parent, subsidiary or affiliate of Xerox, or to a person or entity for the purposes of securitizing a pool of assets or as part of a third party financial transaction without prior notice to you; provided, however, any proposed assignment to a person or entity not identified previously in this sentence shall require your prior written consent. In the event of an assignment permitted by the preceding sentence, Xerox, without notice to you, may release information it has about you related to this Agreement. Each successive assignee of Xerox shall have all of the rights but none of the obligations of Xerox hereunder. You shall continue to look to Xerox for performance of Xerox's obligations, including the provision of Basic Services, and you hereby waive and release any assignees of Xerox from any such claim relating to or arising from the performance of Xerox's obligations hereunder. You shall not assert any defense, counterclaim or setoff that you may have or claim against Xerox against

any assignees of Xerox. In the event of an assignment by Xerox, you shall remit payments due in accordance with remittance instructions of the assignee.

9. MINIMUM LEASE PAYMENTS. Each Minimum Lease Payment (which may be billed on more than one invoice) includes a Periodic Base Charge, and may include a Periodic Minimum Number of Prints. The Minimum Lease Payments, along with any additional Print Charges for prints made in excess of the Minimum Number of Prints, cover your cost for the use of the Equipment and its maintenance (provided as Basic Services).

10. MAINTENANCE COMPONENT PRICE INCREASES. Xerox may annually increase that amount of the Minimum Lease Payment and Print Charges you are charged for maintenance of the Equipment (the "Maintenance Component"), each such increase not to exceed 10%. (For state and local government customers, this adjustment shall take place at the commencement of each of your annual contract cycles.)

11. TITLE, RISK & RELOCATION. Title to the Equipment shall remain with Xerox until you exercise your option to purchase it. Until you exercise your option to purchase the Equipment, you agree that: (a) it shall remain personal property; (b) you will not attach any of it as a fixture to any real estate; (c) you will not pledge, sub-lease or part with possession of it or file or permit to be filed any lien against it; and, (d) you will not make any permanent alterations to it. The risk of loss due to your fault or negligence, as well as theft, fire or disappearance, shall pass to you upon shipment from a Xerox controlled facility. The risk of loss due to all other causes shall remain with Xerox unless and until you exercise your option to purchase the Equipment. Until title passes to you, all Equipment relocations must be arranged (or approved in advance) by Xerox and shall be at your expense. While Equipment is being relocated, you are responsible for all payments required to Xerox under this Agreement. Equipment cannot be relocated outside of the United States, its territories or possessions until you have exercised the Purchase Option indicated in this Agreement. If you acquire title to the Equipment, you must comply with all applicable laws and regulations regarding the export of any commodity, technology and/or software. All parts/materials replaced, including as part of an upgrade, will become Xerox's property.

12. DEFAULT & REMEDIES; LATE CHARGES & COLLECTION COSTS.

A. For any payment not received by Xerox within ten (10) days of the due date as set forth herein, Xerox may charge, and you agree to pay, a late charge equal to the higher of five percent (5%) of the amount due or \$25 (not to exceed the maximum amount permitted by law) as reasonable collection costs.

B. You will be in default under this Agreement if (1) Xerox does not receive any payment within fifteen (15) days after the date it is due or (2) if you breach any other obligation hereunder. If you default, Xerox, in addition to its other remedies (including the cessation of Basic Services), may require immediate payment, as liquidated damages for loss of bargain and not as a penalty, of: (a) all amounts then due, plus interest on all amounts due from the due date until paid at the rate of one and one-half percent (1.5%) per month (not to exceed the maximum amount permitted by law); (b) the remaining Minimum Lease Payments in the Agreement's term less any unearned finance, maintenance, and supply charges (as reflected on the lessor's books and records); (c) a reasonable disengagement fee calculated by Xerox that will not exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the amount in (b) above (said amount is available from Xerox upon request); and (d) all applicable Taxes. You also shall either (1) make the Equipment available for removal by Xerox when requested to do so by Xerox and, at the time of removal, the Equipment shall be in the same condition as when delivered (reasonable wear and tear excepted), together with any related software, or (2) purchase the Equipment "AS IS, WHERE IS" and WITHOUT ANY WARRANTY AS TO CONDITION OR VALUE by paying Xerox the Purchase Option and all applicable Taxes. Xerox's decision to waive or forgive a particular default shall not prevent Xerox from declaring any other default. In addition, if you default under this Agreement, you agree to pay all of the costs Xerox incurs to enforce its rights against you, including reasonable attorneys' fees and actual costs.

13. CARTRIDGES. Cartridges packed with Equipment and replacement Cartridges may be new, remanufactured or reprocessed. Remanufactured and reprocessed Cartridges meet Xerox's new Cartridge performance standards and contain new and/or reprocessed components. To enhance print quality, the Cartridge(s) for many models of Equipment have been designed to cease functioning at a predetermined point. In addition, many Equipment models are designed to function only with Cartridges that are newly manufactured original Xerox Cartridges or with Cartridges intended for use in the U.S. Equipment configuration that permits use of non-newly manufactured original Xerox Cartridges may be available from Xerox at an additional charge. Cartridges sold as Environmental Partnership ("EP") Cartridges remain the property of Xerox. You agree that you shall return all EP Cartridges and may return other Cartridges to Xerox, at Xerox's expense when using Xerox-supplied shipping labels, for remanufacturing once such Cartridges cease functioning.

14. EQUIPMENT STATUS. Unless you are acquiring Previously Installed Equipment, Equipment will be either (a) "Newly Manufactured", which may contain some recycled components that are reconditioned; (b) "Factory Produced New Model", which is manufactured and newly serialized at a Xerox factory, adds functions and features to a product previously disassembled to a Xerox predetermined standard, and contains both new components and recycled components that are reconditioned; or, (c) "Remanufactured", which has been factory produced following disassembly to a Xerox predetermined standard and contains both new components that are reconditioned.

15. LEASE OPTIONS. The following options are available for Equipment subject to this Agreement.

A. PURCHASE OPTION. If not in default, you may purchase the Equipment, "AS IS, WHERE-IS" and WITHOUT ANY WARRANTY AS TO CONDITION OR VALUE: (i) at the end of the lease term for the Purchase Option indicated on the face of this Agreement (i.e. either a set dollar amount or the Fair Market Value of the Equipment at the lease term's conclusion ["FMV"]), plus all applicable Taxes, or (ii) any time during the lease term by paying: (1) all amounts then due; (2) the remaining Minimum Lease Payments in the Agreement's term less any unearned finance, maintenance, and supply charges (as reflected on the lessor's books and records); (3) a reasonable disengagement fee calculated by Xerox that will not exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the amount in (2) above (said amount is available from Xerox upon request); (4) the applicable Purchase Option; and (5) all applicable Taxes.

B. RENEWAL. Unless either party provides notice at least thirty (30) days before the end of the lease term of its intention not to renew this Agreement, it will be renewed automatically on a month-to-month basis at the same price, terms and conditions and billing frequency as the original Agreement. During this renewal period, either party may terminate this Agreement upon at least thirty (30) days notice.

C. LEASE TERMINATION. Upon termination pursuant to B. above, and if you have not purchased the Equipment, you shall make the Equipment available for removal by Xerox when requested to do so by Xerox and, at the time of removal, the Equipment shall be in the same condition as when delivered (reasonable wear and tear excepted), together with any related software.

16. PROTECTION OF XEROX'S RIGHTS. You hereby authorize Xerox or its agents to file, by any permissible means, financing statements necessary to protect Xerox's rights as the Equipment Lessor. Xerox, on your behalf and at your expense, may take any action required to be taken by you under this Agreement that you fail to take.

17. REPRESENTATIONS, WARRANTIES & COVENANTS. Each party represents that, as of the date of this Agreement, it has the lawful power and authority to enter into this Agreement, the individuals signing this Agreement are duly authorized to do so on its behalf and, by entering this Agreement, it will not violate any law or other agreement to which it is a party. You are not aware of anything that will have a material negative effect on your ability to satisfy your payment obligations under this Agreement and all financial information you have provided, or will provide, to Xerox is true and accurate and provides a good representation of your financial condition. Each party agrees that it will promptly notify the other party in writing of a change in ownership, if it relocates its principal place of business.

18. NOTICES. Notices must be in writing and will be deemed given five (5) days after mailing, or two (2) days after sending by nationally recognized overnight courier, to the other party's business address, or to such other address designated by either party to the other by written notice given pursuant to this sentence. The term "business address" shall mean, for you, the "Bill to" address listed on the first page of this Agreement and, for Xerox, our inquiry address set forth on the most recent invoice to you.

19. FORCE MAJEURE. Xerox shall not be liable to you during any period in which its performance is delayed or prevented, in whole or in part, by a circumstance beyond its reasonable control, which circumstances include, but are not limited to, the following: act of God (e.g., flood, earthquake, wind); fire; war; act of a public enemy or terrorist; act of sabotage; strike or other labor dispute; riot; misadventure of the sea; inability to secure materials and / or transportation; or, a restriction imposed by legislation, an order or a rule or regulation of a governmental entity. If such a circumstance occurs, Xerox shall undertake reasonable action to notify you of the same.

20. MISCELLANEOUS. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement as to its subject matter, supersedes all prior and contemporaneous oral and written agreements, and shall be construed under the laws of the State of New York (without regard to conflict-of-law principles). You agree to the jurisdiction and venue of the federal and state courts in Monroe County, New York. In any action to enforce this Agreement, the parties agree to waive their right to a jury trial. If a

court finds any term of this Agreement to be unenforceable, the remaining terms of this Agreement shall remain in effect. Both parties may retain a reproduction (e.g., electronic image, photocopy, facsimile) of this Agreement which shall be admissible in any action to enforce it, but only the Agreement held by Xerox shall be considered an original. Xerox may accept this Agreement either by its authorized signature or by commencing performance (e.g., Equipment delivery, initiating Basic Services, etc.). All changes to this Agreement must be made in a writing signed by both parties; accordingly, any terms on your ordering documents shall be of no force or effect. The following four sentences control over every other part of this Agreement and over all other documents now or later pertaining to this Agreement. We both intend to comply with applicable laws. In no event will Xerox charge or collect any amounts in excess of those allowed by applicable law. Any part of this Agreement that would, but for this Section, be read under any circumstances to allow for a charge higher than that allowed under any applicable legal limit, is limited and modified by this Section to limit the amounts chargeable under this Agreement to the maximum amount allowed under the legal limit. If, in any circumstances, any amount in excess of that allowed by law is charged or received, any such charge will be deemed limited by the amount legally allowed and any amount received by Xerox in excess of that legally allowed will be applied by us to the payment of amounts legally owed under this Agreement, or refunded to you.

<u>SOFTWARE TERMS</u>: The following additional terms apply only to transactions covering Application Software and/or Xerox-brand Equipment:

21. SOFTWARE LICENSE. The following terms apply to copyrighted software and the accompanying documentation, including, but not limited to, operating system software, provided with or within the Xerox-brand Equipment acquired hereunder ("Base Software") as well as software specifically set out as "Application Software" on the face of this Agreement. This license does not apply to any Diagnostic Software or to any software / documentation accompanied by a clickwrap or shrinkwrap license agreement or otherwise made subject to a separate license agreement.

A. Xerox grants you a non-exclusive, non-transferable license to use the Base Software within the United States, its territories, and possessions (the "United States") only on or with the Equipment with which (or within which) it was delivered. For Application Software, Xerox grants you a non-exclusive, nontransferable license to use this software within the United States on any single unit of equipment for as long as you are current in the payment of any indicated software license fees (including any Annual Renewal Fees). You have no other rights to the Base or Application Software and, in particular, may not: (1) distribute, copy, modify, create derivatives of, decompile, or reverse engineer this software; (2) activate any software delivered with or within the Equipment in an unactivated state; or, (3) allow others to engage in same. Title to the Base and Application Software and all copyrights and other intellectual property rights in it shall at all times reside solely with Xerox and/or its licensors (who shall be considered third-party beneficiaries of this Agreement's software and limitation of liability provisions). Base and Application Software may contain, or be modified to contain, computer code capable of automatically disabling proper operation or functioning of the Equipment. Such disabling code may be activated if: (a) Xerox is denied reasonable access to the Base or Application Software to periodically reset such code; (b) you are notified of a default under any term of this Agreement; or, (c) your license is terminated or expires.

B. Xerox may terminate your license for any Base Software (1) immediately if you no longer use or possess the Equipment or are a lessor of the Equipment and your first lessee no longer uses or possesses it, or (2) upon the termination of any agreement under which you have rented or leased the Equipment.

C. If you transfer possession of the Equipment after you obtain title to it, Xerox will offer the transferee a license to use the Base Software within the United States on or with it, subject to Xerox's then-applicable terms and license fees, if any, and provided the transfer is not in violation of Xerox's rights.

D. Xerox warrants that the Base and Application Software will perform in material conformity with its user documentation for a ninety (90) day period from the date it is delivered or, for software installed by Xerox, the date of software installation. Neither Xerox nor its licensors warrant that the Base or Application Software will be free from errors or that its operation will be uninterrupted.

22. SOFTWARE SUPPORT. During the period that Xerox (or a designated servicer) provides Basic Services for the Equipment but in no event longer than five (5) years after Xerox stops taking orders from customers for their acquisition of the subject model of Equipment, Xerox (or a designated servicer) will also provide software support for the Base Software under the following terms. For Application Software licensed pursuant to this Agreement, Xerox will provide software support under the following terms provided you are current in the payment of all Initial License and Annual Renewal Fees (or, for programs not requiring Annual Renewal Fees, the payment of the Initial License Fee and the annual "Support Only" Fees).

A. Xerox will assure that Base and Application Software performs in material conformity with its user documentation and will maintain a toll-free hotline during standard business hours to answer related questions.

B. Xerox may make available new releases of the Base or Application Software that primarily incorporate coding error fixes and are designated as "Maintenance Releases". Maintenance Releases are provided at no charge and must be implemented within six (6) months after being made available to you. Each new Maintenance Release shall be considered Base or Application Software governed by these Software Terms. New releases of the Base or Application Software that are not Maintenance Releases, if any, may be subject to additional license fees at Xerox's then-current pricing and shall be considered Base or Application Software governed by these Software Terms (unless otherwise noted). Xerox will not be in breach of its software support obligations hereunder if, in order to implement, in whole or in part, a new release of Base or Application Software provided or made available to you by Xerox, you must procure, at your expense, additional hardware and/or software from Xerox or any other entity. You agree to return or destroy all prior releases.

C. Xerox will use reasonable efforts, either directly and/or with its vendors, to resolve coding errors or provide workarounds or patches, provided you report problems as specified by Xerox.

D. Xerox shall not be obligated (1) to support any Base or Application Software that is two or more releases older than Xerox's most current release or (2) to remedy coding errors if you have modified the Base or Application Software.

E. For Application Software, Xerox may annually increase the Annual Renewal and Support-Only Fees, each such increase not to exceed 10%. (For state and local-government customers, this adjustment shall take place at the commencement of each of your annual contract cycles.)

23. DIAGNOSTIC SOFTWARE. Software used to maintain the Equipment and/or diagnose its failures or substandard performance (collectively "Diagnostic Software") is embedded in, resides on, or may be loaded onto the Equipment. The Diagnostic Software and method of entry or access to it constitute valuable trade secrets of Xerox. Title to the Diagnostic Software shall at all times remain solely with Xerox and/or Xerox's licensors. You agree that (a) your acquisition of the Equipment does not grant you a license or right to use the Diagnostic Software in any manner, and (b) that unless separately licensed by Xerox to do so, you will not use, reproduce, distribute, or disclose the Diagnostic Software for any purpose (or allow third parties to do so). You agree at all times (including subsequent to the expiration of this Agreement) to allow Xerox to access, monitor, and otherwise take steps to prevent unauthorized use or reproduction of the Diagnostic Software.

<u>GOVERNMENT CUSTOMER TERMS</u>: The following additional terms apply only to lease transactions with state and local government customers:

24. REPRESENTATIONS & WARRANTIES, FUNDING, TAX TREATMENT & PAYMENT.

A. REPRESENTATIONS & WARRANTIES. You hereby represent and warrant, as of the date of this Agreement, that: (1) you are a State or a fully constituted political subdivision or agency of the State in which you are located and are authorized to enter into, and carry out, your obligations under this Agreement and any other documents required to be delivered in connection with the Agreement (collectively, the "Documents"); (2) the Documents have been duly authorized, executed and delivered by you in accordance with all applicable laws, rules, ordinances and regulations (including, but not limited to, all applicable laws governing open meetings, public bidding and appropriations required in connection with this Agreement and the acquisition of the Equipment) and are valid, legal, binding agreements, enforceable in accordance with their terms and the person(s) signing the Documents have the authority to do so, are acting with the full authorization of your governing body and hold the offices indicated below their signatures, each of which are genuine; (3) the Equipment is essential to the immediate performance of a governmental or proprietary function by you within the scope of your authority and shall be used during the lease term only by you and only to perform such function; and, (4) your obligations to remit payments under this Agreement constitute a current expense and not a debt under applicable state law and no provision of this Agreement constitutes a pledge of your tax or general revenues and any provision that is so construed by a court of competent jurisdiction is void from the inception of this Agreement.

B. FUNDING. You represent and warrant that all payments due and to become due during your current fiscal year are within the fiscal budget of such year and are included within an unrestricted and unencumbered appropriation currently available for the lease/purchase of the Equipment, and that it is your intent to use the Equipment for the entire lease term and to make all payments required under this Agreement. In the event that (1) through no action initiated by you your legislative body does not appropriate funds for the continuation of this Agreement for any fiscal year after the first fiscal year and has no funds to do so from other sources, and (2) you have made a reasonable but unsuccessful effort to find a creditworthy

assignee acceptable to Xerox in its sole discretion within your general organization who can continue this Agreement, this Agreement may be terminated. To effect this termination, you shall, thirty (30) days prior to the beginning of the fiscal year for which your legislative body does not appropriate funds for such upcoming fiscal year, send Xerox written notice stating that your legislative body failed to appropriate funds and that you have made the required effort to find an assignee. Your notice must be accompanied by payment of all sums then owed through the current year to Xerox under this Agreement and must certify that the canceled Equipment is not being replaced by equipment performing similar functions during the ensuing fiscal year. In addition, you agree at your expense to return the Equipment in good condition to a location designated by Xerox and that, when returned, the Equipment will be free of all liens and encumbrances. You will then be released from your obligations to make any further payments to Xerox beyond those due for the current fiscal year (with Xerox retaining all sums paid to date).

C. TAX TREATMENT. This Agreement has been accepted on the basis of your representation that Xerox may claim any interest paid by you as exempt from federal income tax under Section 103(c) of the Code. You agree to comply with the information reporting requirements of Section 149(e) of the Code. Such compliance shall include, but not be limited to, the execution of 8038-G or 8038-GC Information Returns. You hereby appoint Xerox as your agent to maintain, and Xerox agrees to maintain, or cause to be maintained, a complete and accurate record of all assignments of this Agreement in form sufficient to comply with the book entry requirements of Section 149(a) of the Code and the regulations prescribed thereunder from time to time. Should Xerox lose the benefit of this exemption as a result of your failure to comply with or be covered by Section 103(c) or its regulations, then, subject to the availability of funds and upon demand by Xerox, you shall pay Xerox an amount equal to its loss in this regard. At the time of executed copy of US Treasury Form 8038 or 8038-GC.

D. PAYMENT. Your payment is due within thirty (30) days of our invoice date.

<u>ADDITIONAL TERMS</u>: The following additional terms apply only to the extent that you have agreed to one or more of the options described below:

25. CONSUMABLE SUPPLIES INCLUDED IN BASE/PRINT CHARGES. If this option has been selected, Xerox (or a designated servicer) will provide you with black toner (excluding highlight color toner), black developer, copy Cartridges, and, if applicable, fuser ("Consumable Supplies") throughout the term of this Agreement. For full-color Equipment, Consumable Supplies shall also include, as applicable, color toner and developer. You agree that the Consumable Supplies are Xerox's property until used by you, that you will use them only with the Equipment, that you will return all Cartridges to Xerox for remanufacturing once they have been run to their cease-function point (at Xerox's expense when using Xeroxsupplied shipping labels), and that at the end of the term of this Agreement either (a) you will return any unused Consumable Supplies to Xerox (at Xerox's expense when using Xerox-supplied shipping labels)or (b) destroy them in a manner permitted by applicable law. Should your use of Consumable Supplies exceed Xerox's published yields for these items by more than 10%, you agree that Xerox shall have the right to charge you for any such excess usage. When requested by Xerox, you agree to provide meter readings and inventory of Consumable Supplies in your possession.

26. REPLACEMENT / MODIFICATION OF PRIOR XEROX AGREEMENT. If this option has been selected, this Agreement will replace or modify a prior agreement between you and Xerox covering the specified equipment. If it is a replacement agreement, the prior agreement shall be null and void. If it is a modification, the prior agreement shall remain in effect except that any terms presented in this modification agreement that conflict with, or are additive to, any of the terms in the prior agreement shall take precedence over the terms in the prior agreement for the balance of the Agreement. In addition, modifications requiring a reamortization of your payments may include a one-time administrative/processing charge that will appear on your first bill under this revised arrangement.

27. XEROX AS FINANCIAL INTERMEDIARY. If this option has been selected, you are leasing specifically identified products that were selected by you and that are not sold by Xerox in the normal course of its business. If you have signed a purchase contract for such products, by signing this Agreement you assign your rights but none of your obligations under such purchase contract to Xerox. With regard to these products, you agree that Xerox is leasing them to you "AS IS, WHERE IS" and that XEROX HAS NOT MADE, AND YOU HEREBY WAIVE, ANY EXPRESS OR IMPLIED REPRESENTATIONS OR WARRANTIES WHATSOEVER, INCLUDING, WITHOUT LIMITATION, (a) ANY IMPLIED WARRANTY OF MERCHANTABILITY, FITNESS FOR PARTICULAR PURPOSE OR NON-INFRINGEMENT, and (b) ANY REPRESENTATION OR WARRANTY REGARDING THE PRODUCTS' SUITABILITY, DESIGN, CONDITION, DURABILITY, OPERATION, QUALITY OF MATERIALS OR WORKMANSHIP, OR COMPLIANCE WITH SPECIFICATIONS OR APPLICABLE LAW. Xerox assigns to you, to the extent assignable, any warranty

rights it has to these products (which rights shall revert to Xerox if you breach this Agreement). You agree (1) that these products are not covered by Xerox's obligation to provide Basic Services; (2) to maintain a service agreement for these products with a service provider acceptable to Xerox throughout this Agreement's term; (3) to pay all personal property taxes related to these products; and (4) to assign to Xerox any rights you have to these products until title passes from Xerox to you (which, subject to any software licenses surrounding the acquisition of these products, shall occur when you obtain title to all Xerox-brand Equipment covered by this Agreement).

28. FINANCED SOFTWARE TOTAL. If this option has been selected, the initial license fees for any Application Software set forth in this Agreement shall be paid for through your Minimum Lease Payments. If you breach this license or any of your obligations regarding the Equipment, the full amount of the initial license fees shall be immediately due and payable.

29. FINANCED SUPPLIES TOTAL. If this option has been selected, the cost of any supplies you have purchased under this Agreement shall be paid for through your Minimum Lease Payments. If you breach any of your obligations regarding the Equipment, the full amount of the supply costs shall become immediately due and payable.

30. REFINANCE OF PRIOR AGREEMENT. If this option has been selected, the balance of your prior indicated agreement with Xerox or a third party shall be paid for through your Minimum Lease Payments. If your prior agreement is with a third party, you hereby acknowledge that you have the right to terminate the agreement and agree to provide a statement from the third-party identifying the equipment at issue and the amount to be paid off (as well as a statement from you identifying the payee and mailing address for your payoff check). If your prior agreement was with Xerox, the use of this refinance option shall render your prior agreement null and void. If you breach this Agreement, the full amount of your prior agreement balance shall be immediately due and payable.

31. ADJUSTMENT PERIOD. If this option has been selected, your Minimum Lease Payment and/or Print Charges shall be adjusted in accordance with the information contained in the Adjustment Period portion of this Agreement; as a result, your initial payment(s) shall be different from those payable during the balance of this Agreement.

32. K-16 BILLING SUSPENSION. If this option has been selected, the Maintenance Component of your Minimum Lease Payment and Print Charges will be suspended each year during the months indicated. During these months, you agree that you will not use the Equipment and that Xerox shall not be responsible for providing Basic Services on it. If Xerox provides Basic Services during the K-16 Billing Suspension period, you will be billed at Xerox's then-current Time and Materials ("T&M") rates for such Basic Services.

33. TRADE-IN EQUIPMENT. If this option has been selected, you are providing equipment to Xerox as part of this Agreement ("Trade-In Equipment") and the following shall apply:

A. TITLE TRANSFER. You warrant that you have the right to transfer title to the Trade-In Equipment and that it has been installed and performing its intended function. Title and risk of loss to the Trade-In Equipment shall pass to Xerox when Xerox removes it from your premises.

B. CONDITION. You warrant that the Trade-In Equipment is in good working order, has not been modified from its original configuration (other than by Xerox), and has a UL label attached. You agree to maintain the Trade-In Equipment at its present site and in substantially its present condition until removed by Xerox.

C. ACCRUED CHARGES. You agree to pay all accrued charges for the Trade-In Equipment (up to and including payment of the Final Principal Payment Number) and to pay all maintenance, administrative, supply and finance charges for this equipment through the date title passes to Xerox.

34. RUN LENGTH PLAN. If this option has been selected, the first ten prints of each original (per run) are recorded and billed on both meters with all subsequent prints recorded and billed on Meter A only.

35. FIXED PRICE PLAN. If this option has been selected, Xerox will forego its right to increase the Maintenance Component throughout the initial term of this Agreement.

36. PER-FOOT PRICING. If this option has been selected, all Print Charges will be billed on a per-foot basis, with each linear or square foot, as applicable, equal to one print.

37. EXTENDED SERVICE HOURS. If this option has been selected, Xerox will provide Basic Services during the hours indicated, with the first number establishing the number of eight-hour shifts covered and the second establishing the days of the week (e.g., 2×6 would provide service from 8:00 A.M. to 11:59 P.M., Monday through Saturday). The cost of this enhanced service coverage will be

billed separately and, as such, is not included in your Minimum Lease Payment or Print Charges.

38. ATTACHED ADDENDA. If this option has been selected, you acknowledge that one or more specified addenda (as indicated) have been provided to you. These addenda, which provide additional terms relevant to the transactions covered hereunder, are hereby fully integrated into this Agreement.

39. NEGOTIATED CONTRACT. If this option has been selected, the Products identified in this Agreement are subject solely to the terms contained in (a) either (1) the identified Negotiated Contract for a lease transaction or (2) if there are no such terms in the Negotiated Contract, the terms set forth in this Agreement, and, if applicable and notwithstanding anything to the contrary set forth in the Negotiated Contract, (b) the "Additional Terms" portion of this Agreement for the selected option or options to the extent the subject matter of any such selected option is not addressed in the Negotiated Contract.

40. DSA CONTRACT NUMBER. If a DSA Contract Number has been inserted, the Equipment and/or software identified in this Agreement are associated with the Services being provided under the referenced Document Services Agreement ("DSA"), but such Equipment and/or software are subject solely to the terms contained in this Agreement.

The parties agree that the following provisions are hereby incorporated into the contract to which it is attached and made a part thereof, said contract being the _____ day of _____, 20____.

- <u>Terms Herein Controlling Provisions</u>: It is expressly agreed that the terms of each and every provision in this attachment shall prevail and control over the terms of any other conflicting provision in any other document relating to and a part of the contract in which this attachment is incorporated.
- 2. <u>Agreement With Kansas Law</u>: All contractual agreements shall be subject to, governed by, and construed according to the laws of the State of Kansas.
- 3. <u>Termination Due To Lack Of Funding Appropriation</u>: If, in the judgment of the Director of Accounts and Reports, Department of Administration, sufficient funds are not appropriated to continue the function performed in this agreement and for the payment of the charges hereunder, State may terminate this agreement at the end of its current fiscal year. State agrees to give written notice of termination to contractor at least 30 days prior to the end of its current fiscal year, and shall give such notice for a greater period prior to the end of such fiscal year. Contractor shall have the right, at the end of such fiscal year, to take possession of any equipment provided State under the contract. State will pay to the contractor all regular contractual payments incurred through the end of such fiscal year, plus contractual charges incidental to the return of any such equipment. Upon termination of the agreement by State, tille to any such equipment shall revert to contractor at the end of State's current fiscal year. The termination of the contract pursuant to this paragraph shall not cause any penalty to be charged to the agency or the contractor.
- <u>Disclaimer Of Liability</u>: Neither the State of Kansas nor any agency thereof shall hold harmless or indemnify any contractor beyond that liability incurred under the Kansas Tort Claims Act (K.S.A. 75-6101 <u>et seq.</u>).
- 5. <u>Anti-Discrimination Clause</u>: The contractor agrees: (a) to comply with the Kansas Act Against Discrimination (K.S.A. 44-1001 <u>et seq.</u>) and the Kansas Age Discrimination in Employment Act (K.S.A. 44-1111 <u>et seq.</u>) and the applicable provisions of the Americans With Disabilities Act (42 U.S.C. 12101 <u>et seq.</u>) (ADA) and to not discriminate against any person because of race, religion, color, sex, disability, national origin or ancestry, or age in the admission or access to, or treatment or employment in, its programs or activities; (b) to include in all solicitations or advertisements for employees, the phrase "equal opportunity employer"; (c) to comply with the reporting requirements set out at K.S.A. 44-1031 and K.S.A. 44-1116; (d) to include those provisions in every subcontract or purchase order so that they are binding upon such subcontractor or vendor; (e) that a failure to comply with the reporting requirements of contracting is breach of contract and the contract may be cancelled, terminated or suspended, in whole or in part, by the contracting state agency or the Kansas Department of Administration; (f) if it is determined that the contractor has violated applicable provisions of ADA, such violation shall constitute a breach of contract and the contract may be cancelled, terminated or suspended, in whole or in p

Parties to this contract understand that the provisions of this paragraph number 5 (with the exception of those provisions relating to the ADA) are not applicable to a contractor who employs fewer than four employees during the term of such contract or whose contracts with the contracting state agency cumulatively total \$5,000 or less during the fiscal year of such agency.

- 6. <u>Acceptance Of Contract</u>: This contract shall not be considered accepted, approved or otherwise effective until the statutorily required approvals and certifications have been given.
- 7. <u>Arbitration, Damages, Warranties</u>: Notwithstanding any language to the contrary, no interpretation shall be allowed to find the State or any agency thereof has agreed to binding arbitration, or the payment of damages or penalties upon the occurrence of a contingency. Further, the State of Kansas shall not agree to pay attorney fees and late payment charges beyond those available under the Kansas Prompt Payment Act (K.S.A. 75-6403), and no provision will be given effect which attempts to exclude, modify, disclaim or otherwise attempt to limit implied warranties of merchantability and fitness for a particular purpose.
- <u>Representative's Authority To Contract</u>: By signing this contract, the representative of the contractor thereby represents that such person is duly authorized by the contractor to execute this contract on behalf of the contractor and that the contractor agrees to be bound by the provisions thereof.
- <u>Responsibility For Taxes</u>: The State of Kansas shall not be responsible for, nor indemnify a contractor for, any federal, state or local taxes which may be imposed or levied upon the subject matter of this contract.
- 10. <u>Insurance</u>: The State of Kansas shall not be required to purchase, any insurance against loss or damage to any personal property to which this contract relates, nor shall this contract require the State to establish a "self-insurance" fund to protect against any such loss or damage. Subject to the provisions of the Kansas Tort Claims Act (K.S.A. 75-6101 <u>et seq.</u>), the vendor or lessor shall bear the risk of any loss or damage to any personal property in which vendor or lessor holds title.
- 11. <u>Information</u>: No provision of this contract shall be construed as limiting the Legislative Division of Post Audit from having access to information pursuant to K.S.A. 46-1101 <u>et seq</u>.
- 12. <u>The Eleventh Amendment</u>: "The Eleventh Amendment is an inherent and incumbent protection with the State of Kansas and need not be reserved, but prudence requires the State to reiterate that nothing related to this contract shall be deemed a waiver of the Eleventh Amendment."

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3-I PARKING LOT LICENSE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this _____ day of February, 2007, by and between THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS, FINNEY COUNTY, KANSAS (County), and THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, GARDEN CITY COMMUNITY COLLEGE, Finney County, Kansas (College);

WITNESSETH, THAT:

WHEREAS, the County owns real property known and generally identified as the 3-I Parking Lot, used for parking and exhibition purposes in conjunction with activities conducted at or in conjunction with the Finney County Fairgrounds; and,

WHEREAS, the College, through its Department of Public Safety, and the Criminal Justice, Emergency Medical Services Technologies, and Fire Science Programs and curriculum offered and conducted through such Department, provides education and training for its staff and students in the use and operation of police, fire and medical emergency vehicles, and desires to secure a site whereat such education and training might best be provided.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the recitals and the terms and conditions as set forth, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. <u>GRANT OF LICENSE</u>. County grants to College, and to College's instructors, employees, students, guests, and invitees, the right, privilege, and permission to enter into and on a certain tract of property owned by County located in the County of Finney, State of Kansas, as identified upon Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated herein, known and generally identified as the 3-I Parking Lot (Premises).

2. <u>PURPOSE</u>. The above-granted permission is for the purpose of the College, at specified times established as hereinafter provided, utilizing the Premises, or portions thereof as scheduled, to provide education and training for its staff and students in the use and operation of police, fire and medical emergency vehicles and related equipment, including both extrication labs and defensive driving, as a part of accredited courses offered and provided through the Department of Public Safety of the College, inclusive of its programs in Criminal Justice, Emergency Medical Services Technologies, and Fire Science. The term "vehicles and related equipment" shall include fire control, fire rescue or emergency medical services equipment as defined in the Kansas Tort Claims Act, K.S.A. 2005 Supp. 75-6102(I), as from time to time amended.

3. <u>SCHEDULING</u>. The parties shall mutually cooperate in the advance planning for the use of the Premises, and in scheduling any permitted use by the College. Any permitted College use shall be scheduled in advance through the Finney County Fairground office. Each party shall designate the person or office through which all contacts and such scheduling shall be made. Initially, the County designates its fairground manager, and the College designates the Director of the Department of Public Safety. The designations may change from time to time during the term of this agreement, providing written notice of same is given to the other party. The notice shall identify the new contact person by name and position, and provide mailing and physical address and telephone number. In the event of a conflict in the College's use of the Premises at a requested time, the same shall be subordinate to events previously scheduled on the Premises by the County.

4. <u>NON-EXCLUSIVE USE</u>. Nothing herein shall be deemed to provide the College with the exclusive use of the entire Premises at any scheduled time; the County may schedule other events or usages of the Premises, subject to reasonable advance notice to and scheduling thereof with the College, so long as the same does not prevent the College from conducting any previously scheduled Premises usage.

5. <u>CONFLICTING USE</u>. In the event a paying client/customer requests the use of the Premises for an event or event parking upon a portion of the Premises previously approved for use by the College, the County shall give notice of such request to the College, and if the notice of requested conflicting use is given not less than 14 days in advance of the College's scheduled use, and the College's planned use cannot be relocated to any other portion of the Premises, the College agrees to and shall accommodate such request and reschedule its planned use.

6. <u>OTHER FAIRGROUND FACILITIES</u>. This Agreement shall not apply to the use of other Fairground Facilities by the College. Any use of other facilities by the College shall continue to be subject to the County's scheduling and usage fee policies.

7. **WARRANTY**. The County does not warrant or represent that the Premise is safe or suitable for the purposes for which it is permitted to be used under the terms of this Agreement. The College, and its instructional personnel, shall be solely responsible for the determination of the adequacy and suitability of the Premises or any portion thereof utilized in any instruction or training provided by the College.

8. <u>**TERM & RENEWAL**</u>. The initial term shall be the balance of the current school year, commencing upon execution hereof by the parties, and running through and terminat-

ing on June 30, 2007. Thereafter, this agreement shall automatically renew and continue from year to year, on a July 1 to June 30 school year basis, unless either party terminates this agreement by delivering to the other party written notice of termination no later than 90 days in advance of the termination date.

9. **<u>NO PAYMENT</u>**. The privilege granted by this agreement is without any monetary consideration and is an accommodation to the College, and is revocable at any time by County, provided County gives at least 90 days written notice prior to the effective date of any such revocation.

10. **MAINTENANCE**. The College shall maintain that portion of the Premises used under this Agreement in the condition as delivered by the County at the time of any such usage, normal wear and tear of the asphaltic surface from typical traffic usage excluded. Any damage caused to the Premises and improvements thereon, or any portion thereof, shall be repaired by and be the responsibility of the party whose use of the Premises caused such damage. To this end, pre- and post-use inspections of the portion of the Premises used by the College hereunder shall be conducted by the parties jointly, and a record made of any damage to or unusual condition of the Premises.

11. **NO STRUCTURES**. College agrees not to erect or cause to be permitted to be erected on the Premises any improvements or structures, whether permanent or temporary, absent the prior written consent of the County with respect to any such structure.

12. <u>SUPERVISION</u>. To the extent supervision of any education or training in the use and operation of emergency vehicles occurs shall be deemed or become necessary, the College shall be solely responsible for such determination and any supervision. Any permitted use of the Premises by the College shall at all times be supervised by appropriate College instructors or personnel.

13. **RELATIONSHIP**. The relationship of the parties as a result of this agreement shall be deemed licensor and licensee, and no other relationship by way of agency, partnership, joint venture, or employment is intended hereby and none shall be implied.

15. **LIABILITY AND INSURANCE**. Each party shall be solely responsible for maintaining any insurance upon the Premises, or the use thereof as herein permitted, as deemed necessary or appropriate by such party. Nothing in this agreement shall be deemed (a) to create any obligation on the part of the County or the College beyond that as provided in the Kansas Tort Claims Act, K.S.A. 75-6101 *et seq.*, as from time to time amended, to obtain or maintain insurance for a liability amount in excess of any limit in such Act provided, (b) to waive any exception from liability as in such Act provided, or (c) to waive liability exemptions for Premises use as otherwise specifically provided by Kansas law. Nothing in the agreement shall be deemed to make either of the parties hereto additional parties insured under any policy of insurance maintained by the other, now or in the future, absent the express written consent or acknowledgment by both the insuring party and its insurer; nor shall this agreement be deemed to create or be a hold harmless or indemnity obligation on the part of the College in favor of the County, its officers, directors, employees or agents.

15. <u>AUTHORITY & LIMITATION</u>. Each party has full authority to make and enter into this agreement, the County by virtue of K.S.A. 19-101, and the College by virtue of K.S.A. 71-201. Each party shall take any and all appropriate action to adopt and approve this agreement by resolution or motion, and shall cause a copy of same to be filed of public record if required by the laws of the state. This agreement is subject to change or termination by the Legislature of the State of Kansas as provided by K.S.A. 71-201.

16. <u>ADDITIONAL APPROVALS</u>. Should this agreement at any time be deemed a form of interlocal cooperation subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 12-2901 *et seq.*, or 12-3901 *et seq.*, the parties shall cooperate and obtain the approval hereof by the appropriate authorities.

17. **DEFAULT**. In the event any party fails or refuses to abide by the terms and conditions of this agreement, hereinafter referred to as "default," the non-defaulting party may elect to terminate this agreement. Provided, the non-defaulting party shall give written notice of intent to terminate by reason of default not less than 90 days prior to the effective date of termination. Such notice shall identify the default and the action required to cure the default, and if the defaulting party shall take and complete the action necessary to cure the default withing 60 days of the date of the notice of intent to terminate, but rather shall continue in accordance with its terms. This agreement shall not limit in any manner the legal rights and remedies available to a party should default occur. The waiver of any default hereunder shall not constitute a waiver or release of any of the terms and conditions of this agreement or a waiver of any like or similar future default.

18. **GENERAL**. There may be no modification of this agreement except in writing, executed by the parties. If any part, term, or provision of this agreement or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this agreement which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to such end the provisions of this agreement are deemed to

be severable. Headings are inserted for ease of reference, and shall not be deemed to define, limit, or extend the scope or intent of the section to which they pertain. This agreement and each and every term and provision hereof, shall be binding upon the parties hereto, their representatives, successors and assigns.

SIMULATION MANIKIN USER AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, made effective this _____ day of _____, 2007, by and between GARDEN CITY COMMUNITY COLLEGE (College), party of the first part, and ST. CATHERINE HOSPITAL (Hospital), party of the second part;

WITNESSETH, THAT:

WHEREAS, the College has established and provides approved and accredited nursing and allied health programs, and has a need to provide simulated learning experiences in both didactic and clinical settings as a means to develop and evaluate contextual learning, critical thinking, and patient assessment for nursing and allied health students, and a need to reduce attrition among program students; and,

WHEREAS, the Hospital would benefit from access to and use of simulated learning experiences for purposes of staff development and facilitating competency in clinical decision making, both skill training and assessment; and,

WHEREAS, as a teaching hospital, Hospital has a history of collaboration with Western Kansas Community Colleges in training and educating health care professionals, and presently serves as a site for clinical education of students enrolled in Colby Community College and Seward County Community College nursing and allied health program, in addition to the program provided by the College;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the recitals, as well as the mutual terms and conditions as herein set forth, including the performance thereof by the parties, it is agreed:

1. <u>SUBJECT</u>. The parties agree that they shall cooperatively develop, implement and maintain an Advanced Skills Simulation Lab (Simulation Lab) for the purposes and usage as in this agreement set forth.

2. <u>**RELATIONSHIP**</u>. This agreement is intended to supplement other relationships that exist between the parties, such as affiliating agreements for use of the Hospital as the site for clinical training of College students regularly enrolled in nursing and allied health programs¹. Nothing in

¹Agreement dated August 7, 2006 by and between the Board of Trustees as College and St. Catherine Hospital as Cooperating Agency, for clinical practice of nursing program (e.g., see

this agreement is intended or shall it be construed to change the relationship established by such other agreements. The liabilities and responsibilities of the parties, if any, shall be as fixed, and construed as provided, in such other agreements, except as otherwise herein expressly provided.

3. <u>COLLEGE CONTRIBUTION</u>. The College agrees to acquire and make available for use in the Simulation Lab (a) Simulation Equipment consisting of and including:

- 3 each: Medical Education Technology (METI) Emergency Care Simulator (ECS) with curriculum software and licenses;
- 1 each: Laerdal SimBaby infant simulator with laptop and compressor;
- 1 each: VitaSim control unit; nursing kid (VitaSim capable); nursing baby (VitaSim capable);
- 1 each: NOELLE maternal and neonatal birthing simulator;
- 1 each: Infant warmer with bassinet;
- IV poles: as needed;
- 1 each: Camera package for observation;

(b) all software necessary for use in the operation of such Simulation Equipment, including updates as available; (c) extended warranties on each of the foregoing items of Simulation Equipment to the extent available and as deemed necessary by the College. The College shall retain ownership of, and risk of loss with respect to, all Simulation Equipment, software and warranties.

4. <u>HOSPITAL CONTRIBUTION</u>. The Hospital shall provide (a) necessary and appropriate rooms or space for location of the simulation equipment, sufficient to allow necessary patient beds plus instructor observation; (b) equipment consisting of four hospital beds, mattresses, infant warmer with bassinet, IV pole, fetal monitor tray, and supply cabinets; (c) necessary utilities for operation of the Simulation Lab and Equipment; and (d) normal security for the Simulation Lab and Equip

section FOURTH for Liability Status of the Contracting Agencies); and, Affiliation Agreement dated ______, by and between the College and the Hospital as a clinical site for the Emergency Medical Technician–Paramedic training program (e.g., see section II – Mutual Responsibilities).

ment. The Hospital shall retain ownership of, and risk of loss with respect to, all equipment and materials provided to and for use in the operation of the Simulation Lab.

5. **MAINTENANCE**. The College shall be responsible for the maintenance required in the operation of the Simulation Equipment. The Hospital shall maintain in good repair and operating condition the Simulation Lab, and the equipment and materials contributed by the Hospital. The Hospital shall provide normal housekeeping maintenance of the Simulation Equipment. The Hospital shall be required to monitor the good repair and operating condition of the Simulation Equipment, and shall report to the College any breakage or need for repair or maintenance for the Simulation Equipment.

6. **TRAINING FOR USE**. (a) Upon establishment of the Simulation Lab, the College shall make available to approved personnel of the College and the Hospital appropriate and necessary training in the use and operation of the Simulation Equipment. Thereafter, the College shall be responsible for training its clinical faculty regarding the use of the Simulation Equipment and programs, and the Hospital shall be responsible for the training of those of its personnel who are to be responsible for the use of the Simulation Equipment and program.

(b) Instructors from all community college nursing programs utilizing the Hospital as a clinical site, and any other permitted user of the Simulation Lab and Equipment, will be fully trained in the use and operation of the Simulation Lab and Equipment. Only fully trained faculty and staff shall be allowed to use the Simulation Lab for instruction.

(c) In no event shall any student or staff be permitted to utilize the Simulation Lab without the oversight and monitoring of an approved person appropriately trained in the use and operation of such Simulation Lab and Equipment.

(d) Each permitted user shall appoint or otherwise designate a person from its staff, and so notify both the College and the Hospital, who is responsible for identifying qualified, approved and appropriately trained person who will be permitted on behalf of such user to oversee and monitor permitted Simulation Lab and Equipment use.

7. <u>SCHEDULING AND USAGE</u>. (a) The College shall designate a Simulation Instructor/Coordinator, and so notify the Hospital, who shall be responsible for the use of the Simulation Lab and Equipment by College staff and nursing students, and who shall work with the Hospital's Simulation Site Scheduler for all purposes connected with the operation of the Simulation Lab and Equipment.

(b) The Hospital shall designate a Simulation Site Scheduler, and so notify the College, who shall be responsible for scheduling and monitoring the use of the Simulation Lab and Equipment. No usage of the simulation site or Simulation Lab and Equipment shall be permitted without the same having been appropriately scheduled. The College and the Hospital shall jointly have priority in access to and use of the Simulation Lab and Equipment.

(c) The approved staff and students of the Colby Community College, Seward County Community College and Dodge City Community College nursing programs utilizing the Hospital for clinical education programs under the terms of a written affiliating agreement with the Hospital, shall have the right to use the Simulation Lab and Equipment, subject to the terms and conditions hereof.

(d) No party other that the College and the Hospital shall be permitted to commence use of the Simulation Lab and Equipment without having first agreed, in writing delivered to the parties hereto, to be bound by and to comply in all respects with the terms and conditions in this User Agreement provided, including any and all policies, rules and regulations regarding such use as from time to time adopted by the College and Hospital.

8. <u>SUPPLIES</u>. It is anticipated that each user of the Simulation Lab and Equipment shall be responsible for any and all supplies used and/or consumed in utilizing the Simulation Lab and Equipment. The College and the Hospital shall develop and maintain written policies regarding use, replacement and payment for Simulation Lab supplies.

9. <u>USAGE FEES</u>. To support the continued maintenance and operation of the Simulation Lab and Equipment, the parties contemplate establishing a schedule of usage fees that would aid in offsetting the cost of software updates and equipment operation and maintenance costs. Any such schedule of usage fees shall be established by written policy.

10. **<u>DAMAGES</u>**. Notwithstanding the risk-of-loss provisions set forth above, each party or permitted user shall be liable for any damage to or destruction of the Simulation Lab and Equipment,

or the Hospital facilities whereon the same are located, or any portion thereof, caused by or resulting from the willful act or gross and wanton negligence of such party or user, its representatives, agents, employees or students. Damage occurring during the course of any unauthorized use of the Simulation Lab and Equipment shall be deemed willful.

11. **COLLABORATION**. The College and the Hospital, as well as other permitted users of the Simulation Lab and Equipment, shall collaborate in writing scenarios for use in the operation of the simulator that support nursing curriculum and clinical objectives, including the identification and sharing of best practices in simulated clinical learning experiences

12. **PROGRAM EVALUATION**. The parties shall meet not less than once each College semester to evaluate the mutual use and operation of the Simulation Lab and Equipment. This agreement shall be subject to review from time-to-time as the need may arise, in order to consider any amendment, alteration or change as shall be mutually acceptable to the parties.

13. <u>TERM</u>. This agreement shall become effective upon execution by the parties, and acquisition by the College of the Simulation Equipment, and shall continue for a term ending June 30, 2007. Thereafter, this agreement shall continue on a fiscal year basis from year-to-year until and unless terminated by either party hereto upon 90 days advance written notice. In the event notice of termination is given during the course of a collegiate semester, the effective date for such termination shall be extended to the end of any such semester so as to permit the completion of courses of instruction then occurring.

14. **GENERAL**. There may be no modification to or amendment of this agreement except in writing, approved by the governing bodies of and executed by the parties. The waiver of any default hereunder shall not constitute a waiver or release of any of the terms and conditions of this agreement or a waiver of any like or similar future default. Headings are inserted for ease of reference, and shall not be deemed to define, limit or extend the scope or intent of the section to which they pertain. This agreement and each and every of the terms and provisions hereof shall be binding upon the parties hereto, the successors and assigns.

15. <u>MISCELLANEOUS</u>. To the extent this cooperative undertaking shall be deemed an agreement for interlocal cooperation, and thereby subject to and governed by the provisions of K.S.A. 12-2901, *et seq.*, or any similar provision applicable to higher education in the State of

Kansas, the parties shall provide their full faith and best efforts to secure any necessary approval by the Office of the Attorney General for the State of Kansas and the Kansas Board of Regents, as appropriate.

Please consider this letter as appropriate action, per the requirements of the Negotiated Agreement, to initiate my request for paid sabbatical leave.

Should my request meet with the approval of the administration, Faculty Senate and Board of Trustees of Garden City Community College, I will complete course work and research to fulfill the requirements for a Doctor of Philosophy degree in Animal Science, specializing in Meat Science and Muscle Biology at Texas Tech University. I have been approved and readmitted to Texas Tech University with a requirement of 30 course hours and 12 hours of dissertation. These 30 course hours will be obtained during the spring and summer sessions of 2008. Completion of a dissertation/research project will be completed during these 7-8 months. Upon returning to GCCC, I will complete my dissertation and the final 12 hours required for the Ph.D. degree through distance education. My major professor at Texas Tech, Dr. Mark F. Miller, has agreed to allow me to continue coaching the GCCC Meats Judging Team during contest road-trips. I will need the GCCC Assistant Coach to bring students to contests during that spring semester. The first contest of the spring will be held before my classes would start at Texas Tech; therefore, I will be able to take them to the National Western in Denver. The remaining contests are both held in Texas, which is an advantage to where I will be continuing my education and can still travel with the team.

Approval of this request will provide Garden City Community College with the direct benefits of an instructor with the highest possible degree in the Animal Science discipline. This will aid in attracting more students to GCCC and allow me to give them a higher quality and more scientific instruction. Additionally, my degree could allow other entities that would like specialized training in meat science, microbiology or food science to select GCCC for their training and workshop needs. Given my graduate performance while completing a MS degree from Texas Tech (3.90 GPA), I am extremely confident that Garden City Community College's administration, Faculty Senate, and Board of Trustees will recommend approval of this request in good faith that I will return expeditiously to the classroom with this degree completed by the spring semester of 2009.

Pursuant to the Negotiated Agreement, I have forwarded this letter to Judy Crymble and the Faculty Senate for their recommendation. Thank you for your consideration in this matter.

Performance Agreement

Calendar year 2006 marked the third year that the public colleges and universities entered into formal performance agreements with the Board of Regents. Successful achievement of the previous goals outlined in our performance agreement made us eligible for new state funding during the 2007 fiscal year. For calendar year 2006, GCCC successfully two of the three goals it submitted.

All institutional indicators were achieved for Goal 1 (Allied Health Partnership.)

All institutional indicators were achieved for Goal 2 (K-State Articulation.)

None of the indicators was achieved for Goal 3 (Developmental Education.) We saw a decline in the success rates of students in developmental courses (56.40% compared to the baseline of 57.75%.) One factor that influences this percentage is that the college is teaching more developmental students (1243 in 2006 compared to the baseline average of 1094.) More students have skills deficiencies, and the gap between student preparedness and college-level coursework is increasing.

All institutional indicators were achieved or partially achieved for Goal 4 (Hispanic Enrollment.)

The Board of Regents has received this report as of March 1, 2007. We await the review of the Board of Regents as to our eligibility for new state funding for fiscal year 2008. We anticipate a favorable response as we met a majority of the indicators on a majority of the goals.

<u>WorkKeys</u>

Overall, our students do well on the WorkKeys assessments (as has been previously demonstrated in reports to the Board.) For Fall 2005 (the last large-scale outcomes assessment,) the average score for the <u>Reading for Information</u> assessment was near the 80% of Jobs benchmark (4.8 versus the benchmark of 5.0,) and the average score for the <u>Applied Math</u> assessment was near the 80% of Jobs benchmark (4.9 versus the 5.0 benchmark.)

The WorkKeys results continue to be lower on the <u>Locating Information</u> assessment, but the benchmark is also lower. <u>Locating</u> <u>Information</u> The skill people use when they locate, synthesize, and use information from workplace graphics such as charts, graphs, tables, forms, flowcharts, diagrams, floor plans, maps, and instrument gauges is a basic skill required in today's workforce. 75% of all jobs profiled require a Locating Information score of 4.0. As such, the average score was above the benchmark (4.2 versus the benchmark of 4.0.)

Competency Assessment

Adult Learning Center: 349 participants attended classes for a total of 23,153 hours of instruction form July thru December. 66.34 average hours per enrolled participant.

The Associate in Arts (AA) and the Associate in Science (AS) degree requirements, as established by the college, are designed to prepare those students for a successful transfer. Students who indicate that their primary goal is to transfer to a four-year university/college are strongly advised and encourage to complete requirements for either the AS or the AA degree. The Transfer Articulation Agreement (the agreement signed by Kansas Regents Universities and Community Colleges) is designed for successful transfer experiences based on the completion of either the AA or the AS Degree.

Specific requirements for completion of "transfer necessary" courses within the selected majors at GCCC are continually examined and updated by faculty and counselors to meet the current requirements as determined by national accrediting boards/standards or the senior institutions. All changes are immediately made on the Web-Based Advisor Program and are conveyed to students through their advisors. Any modified or changed course equivalencies are also noted and students are notified to check the connection link to the universities that they are considering for transfer purposes.

This past year (2005-06), 352 graduates completed 24 AA degrees, 165 (4 of these were designated as nursing degree completers, ASN) AS degrees, 88 AGS degrees, and 75 AAS degrees (12 were designated as nursing degree completers, AASN). Those students completing the AGS degrees will definitely be short in the general education hours and will have to make up additional hours, upon transferring, along with the courses required at the transfer institution. Several of our students who did not complete graduation requirements prior to their transfer to a four-year institution, complete the courses required for a GCCC degree, and transfer these courses back to earn either the AA or the AS Degree. Those students earning the AAS Degree almost all entered the work force and did not plan to transfer.

The usual Student Transfer Analysis Data supplied by the six regent universities has only been received from the University of Kansas, Kansas State University and Fort Hays State University.

Wichita State University and Emporia State University are not able to access the needed information at this time due to the implementation of a new management information system. Those not received at this time will be reported in the fall semi-annual monitoring report.

Graduation Rate Survey

Fall semester 2002, 372 full-time, first time, degree/certificate-seeking students entered Garden City Community College. Three years later (Spring, 2006) the college completed the Graduation Rate Survey as required by Federal regulations. The college must disclose completion or graduation rates of these students to all students and prospective students. The report also must include graduation/completion rates of those students receiving athletically related student aid by sport and categorized by race/ethnicity, and sex. The data must be disclosed to all potential students; thus this data is listed in the Student Handbooks and the College Catalog. Copies of this survey are available at the Admissions office and the Athletic Director's office.

The survey collects data on each entering Cohort Group and follows their progress 150% of the normal time to complete their programs of study (3 years for programs 2 years in length). Allowable exclusions before the rates are calculated include:

- Student is either deceased or permanently disabled
- Student left school to serve in the military
- Students left school to serve with a foreign aid service of the Federal Government (Peace Corps, etc.)
- Student left school to serve on an official church mission

Summary of the Graduation Survey (GRS)

The Graduation Rate Survey (GRS) for the 2002 cohort group of full-time, first-time degree/certificate seeking students is a part of the "Students Right-to-Know" requirements. The cohort group consisted of 372 students. Summary statistics include the following information:

Of the non-returning students excluding completers, 25% (60) were not making satisfactory academic progress (cumulative grade point average < 2.0). These students were not eligible for financial aid, athletic competition, other grant-in-aid assistance or scholarships. This was definitely a contributing factor to their not returning for the next semester.

The requirements of the report indicate that 68% (a decrease of 2% from the previous year) of our entering cohort group was considered successful completers. These statistics will be shown

to prospective students and parents, as required by federal regulations. This is a positive indicator that our students are prepared for successful transfer to other colleges and universities as well as being successful completers of GCCC programs of study.

Former Students' Survey

The annual Admissions Department survey to students (those enrolled in at least six credit hours during the Fall 2005 semester but who were not enrolled for the Fall 2006 semester) comments are also included in this report. The survey gathers demographic statistical information on these students as well as five questions to determine if the former students felt that the college's Academic Advancement Ends were met for them to successfully transfer. A copy of the Student Follow-Up Survey is also included with the statistical results and individual comments submitted by the students. Most comments were very positive and students indicated that the college was successful in helping them meet these Ends.

Again, as in the past, not all students planned to and/or did not transfer. The responses were counted as not applicable (NA). As some of the responses indicated, many of the students were enrolled in classes not located on the campus (Outreach students, EduKan students); therefore, they did not use academic advising from the GCCC advisors and that question was not applicable to their experiences. Plans are still being considered to designate a "Virtual Advisor" to provide advising assistance to these students via the Web Advisor program.

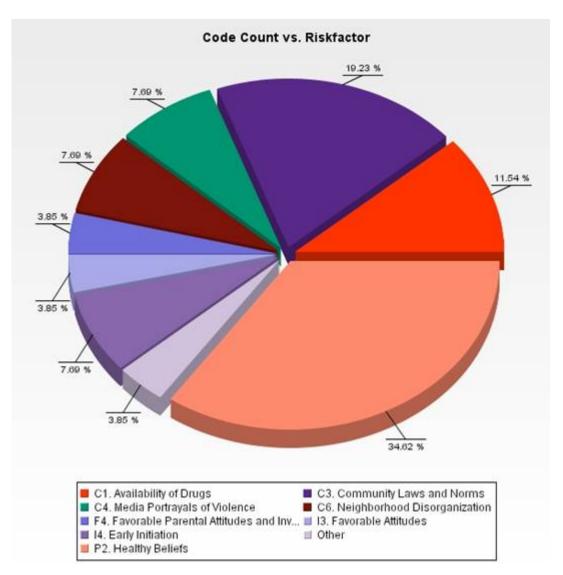
- Per the success of the jewelry class, two additional sessions were added in fall of 2006

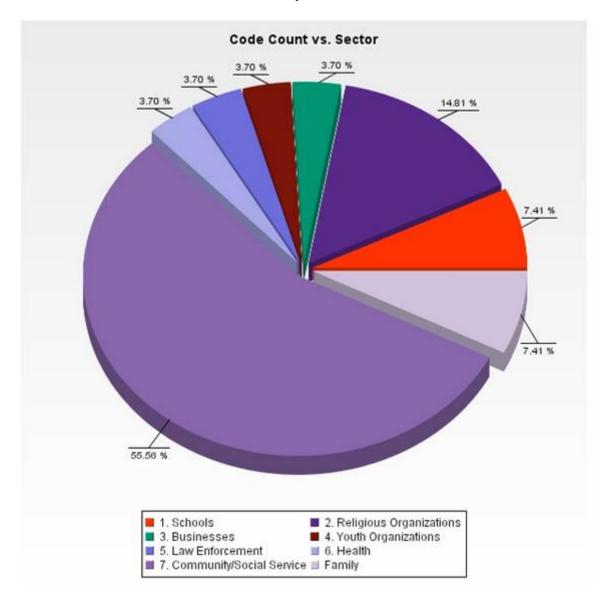
Southwest Kansas Prevention Center:

Note: This pattern reflects continued heavy emphasis on Drug Availability, Community Laws and Norms, and Early Initiation of Problem Behaviors as described in the Highlight Activities (page 1). This report indicates increased activity within the school and religious domains as well as continued heavy emphasis on community initiatives. This pattern does however continue to reflect generally consistent lines of emphasis over the last five years.



Community Sector Focus

Note: As always, the Prevention Center continues to focus heavily on schools and the community. However, increasing focus on health sector and religious sector is apparent here, and is the result of an infusion of participants from these areas into our community work (most notably the Community Health Coalition of Finney County, which is heavily represented by health centered agencies. The emphasis of work in schools is a manifestation of the initiation of an aggressive attempt to seed LifeSkills Training into schools across the region. This includes the institution of LifeSkills Training at GCCC implemented through the Division of Continuing Education and Community Services for the TRiO/Educational Talent Search/Alternative Programs.

WIA Title 1B Activity

Case Managers currently serve 144 active participants who are receiving core, intensive or training services such as: career guidance, determination of program and financial aid eligibility, resume preparation assistance, access to training and technical programs to upgrade and enhance job skills, and follow-up for one year. Students, who qualify for WIA Title 1B financial assistance, are enrolled in technical programs to enhance their ability to achieve gainful employment. During the 2005-06 academic year 61 students were provided these services.

Co-enrollments

WIA legislation has identified *required partners* who must provide services to those who qualify. Forty-two active participants are currently co-enrolled and receiving services through required partners (co-enrollment programs include cash assistance/food stamps, unemployment insurance, vocational rehabilitation, and senior employment program). This number is up from twenty during this same period last year.

Business and Industry All of our courses are designed to be responsive to community and employer needs. Our staff is in contact with the Chamber of Commerce, Downtown Vision, Finney County Economic Development, and many individual businesses each month to create the training schedules.

• There were five contract trainings that resulted in 61 employees receiving training (some classes were mentioned above). These included: Brookover Feedyard Spanish and Ranch Spanish; Henkle Drilling Excel Fundamentals; First Line

Supervision for Law Enforcement; and Security State Bank in Scott City – Customer Service Training.

- A common employer need was Customer Service Training. This class was offered at large and as a contract training for 33 employees trained. Also, as a common issue was the need for supervisory training which was offered both as a contract training and an open training with 28 employees trained.
- Targeted to specific business requests we offered a course on strategic planning for small businesses and non-profits. Also, the same day was a course on volunteer management geared toward non-profits as well.

Information Transfer Actions: The GCCC SBDC filled 648 individual telephone, email, and walk-in requests (from non-clients) for information and assistance, representing approximately 282 hours.

- GCCC SBDC assisted twenty-five (25) Hispanic clients and two (2) black clients with either start-up information or expansion of their small business concerns. Due to the high concentration of Hispanics in Southwest Kansas, *a total of 1/3 of the center's client base*, this office provides a variety of literature and website information printed in Spanish. Interpreters are obtained to assist clients if needed. The staff has worked with several resources to get additional Spanish materials for the office.
- Forty-seven (47) clients were women seeking to either start a business or expand their existing business. This number reflects 42% of the client base. The percentage reflects only the businesses owned solely by women; 18 other clients were couples sharing equally in ownership, bringing the total to 59% of the client base involving women.

Incidental Information GCCC Board of Trustees February 2007

Business and Industry ran 15 classes in January. The Crew Leader training - 22 participants. Real Estate Exam Prep will be offered next month. We partnered with the Business Division to help market the new series of American Management Association classes. Two contract trainings are being scheduled for Sunflower Home Health.

All Continuing Education Community Service staff attended the **Team Building day** and gained insight to the team dynamic.

Our CECS computer lab is set-up and running smoothly. Forklift training, CPR & First Aid and Hazardous Material Safety instructors and curriculum located with contract trainings set up with local businesses.

Upward Bound TRiO Program and Educational Talent Search collaborated on an agenda for the first **student leadership conference development** meeting so that seniors and other Finney County high school students who attended the Chicago conference can help develop a student leadership conference (SLC) for their peers here on campus on April 21, 2007. The busy month then ended with welcoming the new TRiO director to her office.

The CECS **Spring 2007 catalog** is out with 10,000 copies distributed. We will need to print about 15,000 copies for our next catalog. This spring we are offering 30 classes with the possibility of adding two more classes to the schedule at a later date. For our first class, we had 14 people enroll in our Basic Computer course. Other classes are filling up as well and enrollments keep coming in.

We continue to recruit for **Finney County Young Professionals**. Our next activity will be a lecture about global economies. We will meet on Tuesday, February 13, at the Chamber of Commerce.

The SWKRPC loaned **19 videos and kits** to patrons. The website had 1,044 hits during the month of January, which averages to approximately 34 hits a day. The Prevention Center is expanding the Resource Library to meet the demands of its patrons. Over a dozen new videos and promotional items have been ordered and will be arriving within the next couple weeks.

Educational Talent Search students have completed four of fifteen **LifeSkills units** as part of tutoring offered at East Garden Village on Tuesday evenings. We've had 10-14 students each week. They really participate and have been great to work with. LifeSkills classes for all freshmen at Holcomb High School are scheduled for February 26 - March 14. LifeSkills presentations have been made throughout the service area. **Reward & Reminder 2007** is under way. Of 49 visits in Seward and Finney County, only two clerks would have sold tobacco to our cooperating minor youth.

Forty Educational Talent Search students started out the year with a Back to School event for students to come and pick up school supplies. Six high school students visited Wichita State University during the holiday break. Talent Search partnered with the Prevention Center in offering the Life Skills curriculum to a group of ETS participants. Initial planning for the **Spring Student**

Leadership Conference began with the students who attended the SLC in Chicago helping with the planning of this conference.

85% of the students at the **Adult Learning Center** returned after the Christmas Break. 70+ new students came to the orientations for ESL and GED. Increased number of participants by 80 from last year 2^{nd} quarter. The ALC is on track to meet the goal of 69% on educational gains, provides students the opportunity to buy books and continue the learning process at home and will start the GCCC student ID by February 2^{nd} , 40+ students are on the college system and ready for their pictures.

Bryan Education Center/Scott City hosted GCCC financial aid meeting with 65 attending, hosted GCCC recruitment pizza party with 23 attending, and organized GED class for minority students, plus 13 classes being held. Hosted 4 businesses/organizations during January, totally 66 in attendance and generating \$90 in fees and met with Western Kansas One Stop to discuss future program possibilities.

The 2007 Meats Team started the year by competing in the **National Western Meats Contest** held in Greeley, January 14th. We were 3rd in Pork Judging as a team and 5th in Questions.

Individually, Blake Sanders (Eustis, NE) was 5th in Pork Judging, 9th in Questions and 13th overall. Mandy Rollins (Satanta) was high individual in Beef Judging, 6th in Total Beef and 15th overall. Other members selected for the team included Leah Wright (Sublette; 8th in Pork Judging) and Kayla Hurley (Holcomb).

Alternates that also competed included: Danny Koons, Lakin (8th high alternate individual overall), Sabrina Branscum (Ulysses), Ashley Lorenzo (Winchester), Melissa Schritter (Goodland) and Amanda Myers (Garden City).

GCCC Debate & Forensics returned from Webster University (St. Louis) with a 5th place trophy in the 4-year division and a 2nd place trophy in the 2-year division and several individual awards. Western Kentucky, which is considered to have the nation's best debate program, recruited two of our students this past weekend in St. Louis and Washburn University recruited two more.

Three of four **GCCC debate teams** broke out of preliminary rounds and into out-rounds. In the junior division, Kaleb Jesse and Kelcy Hathaway were the top seeded team after prelims, with a record of 5 wins and only 1 loss. Andrew Moorman and Bryce Friesen finished 4-2 and were the 6th seeded team. Jesse and Hathaway were finally eliminated in semi-finals, but defeated teams from Washburn and Notre Dame before going out. Moorman and Friesen were eliminated in octafinals.

Kaleb Jesse took 2nd place overall as an individual debate speaker, and Sarah Staats finished as the 4th highest individual debate speaker.

In the Novice debate division, GCCC team Eron Lira and Lake Battles went 6-0 in prelims and were the number one seeded team before eliminations. This team fell in octafinals.

In individual events, Kaleb Jesse and Kelcy Hathaway finished 6th overall in Improvisational pairs, Eron Lira took top novice in Program of Oral Interpretation and 6th overall, and Kelcy Hathaway finished 3rd overall in Impromptu speaking. Alanea Phillips, Christine Urie, and Wendy Palmer also worked hard to represent GCCC well.

GCCC Debate and Forensics returned from a tournament with a skeleton crew this past weekend at Kansas-Wesleyan's invite.

Kaleb Jesse and Kelcy Hathaway returned with the **1**st **place debate sweepstakes trophy** for open Parliamentary Debate in the 4-year bracket! They received a silver platter trophy for this win, as well as individual trophies for 4th and 5th top speakers in the 4-year category. Jesse and Hathaway went <u>undefeated</u> in preliminaries rounds and lost only the semi-final round in a 1-2 decision. The case Jesse and Hathaway ran in the final round was an attempt to bar the United States from initiating the extraordinary rendition of prisoners to Egypt for torture.

Christine Urie was in competition with her Prose and Poetry selections – and missed breaking into finals by **only 2 quality points**! To put that into perspective, there were a total of 50 quality points up for grabs. The last two competitors to make finals had 56 and 55 points respectively. Ms. Urie earned 54. Her selections were on the children of parents who've died in Iraq, and the turmoil and guilt felt by those who lost a loved one on 9-11 – in tragedies unconnected to the acts of terrorism.

Finally, Danny Pearson competed in his first tournament for GCCC this weekend and did a great job. Danny beat three competitors in his first round and 2 in his second. This was a great effort for a student in his first intercollegiate tournament and the whole team was very proud of him.

Itzel Rodriguez translated in Spanish NASFAA's (National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrator) **Financing Education Beyond High School** to be presented to Hispanic students and their parents. The event was promoted with flyers and marketing via the Spanish newspaper and Spanish radio. The presentation was given on Sunday afternoon, January 28th, at 2pm in SCSC-2024 with two students and two parents attending. Information was made available in both English and Spanish. Other events promoted were College Goal Sunday on February 11 and the Minority Workshop scheduled for February 12.

At their recent Nursing Advisory Committee meeting members indicated their **approval of the proposed program and curriculum revisions**. The curriculum has been approved by the GCCC Learning Services committee and will be sent to KBOR in February for approval and to KSBN in March for their approval. The curriculum changes will also be sent to NLNAC. Changes in program structure reflect a move toward a bi-level program and a career ladder for nursing. Students have the option to exit the program to take NCLEX-PN at the end of the second semester. The advisory committee members indicated that this change would be beneficial for their facilities as it provides practical nursing graduates in December and May of each year. Curriculum changes reflect a shift from teaching to a focus on learning with Nursing faculty embracing the concept of being a guide and facilitator for student learning.

GCCC is updating its **Building Trades curriculum** in anticipation of the need to prepare incumbent and emergent construction workers for the Sunflower Electric Corporation construction project. The revised industry-based curriculum will rely heavily on instructional and assessment materials developed by the National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER). Efforts are also being initiated, in partnership with Sunflower Electric, to update the Power Plant Technology curriculum to support operator training.

Equipment has been ordered and hospital rooms are being prepared for the St. Catherine Hospital and **GCCC advanced simulation lab.** A formal agreement has been completed which defines roles and responsibilities of each partner. We anticipate a March open house that will feature simulation equipment demonstrations for local and regional healthcare professionals.

At their January 2007 meeting, the Local Workforce Investment Board (LWIB) for Local Area 1 announced an \$8,083.34 FY 2005 incentive award to the GCCC One Stop. The award is based on the achievement of a minimum of 100% of all performance goals under the WIA Title 1-B Adult and Dislocated Worker programs and demonstration of continuous improvement as directed by the LWIB.

Success of GCCC DPS graduates relies heavily on the extensive hands-on training offered by these programs. **Emergency Vehicle Operation Center (EVOC)** courses are provided to EMST, Fire Science, and Criminal Justice traditional students and career professionals. The purpose of these courses is to provide students with the knowledge and skills to operate an emergency vehicle, the knowledge of legal (criminal and civil) ramifications of operating an emergency vehicle, the knowledge of the human body's physiological responses to stress while operating an emergency vehicle, basic understand of critical incident response, the ability to respond to environmental and roadway conditions and vehicle dynamics related to emergency vehicle responses.

In order to provide the hands-on portion of EVOC training, DPS has had to clear one of the college parking lots. Accomplishing this has been challenging at best. We are pleased to announce a partnership with Finney County for use of the 3-I Parking Lot for this portion of the training program. A formal agreement has been prepared that will allow the college to schedule EVOC training in an appropriate environment that allows them to practice safe operation of emergency vehicles.

GCCC is working closely with outreach communities and the GCFD to develop a comprehensive program that provides **training for entry level and career professional firefighters**. We have added Officer-I and Haz-Mat Awareness courses and are currently working with the Department of Labor to offer Hazwhopper Initial and Refresher training for area industrial partners. During the Spring 2007 semester Fire Science initiated classes in Ulysses and Leoti and plan to use Polycom interactive distance learning technology to increase outreach capacity. Additional classes will be scheduled for Lakin, Tribune, and Scott City. The Fall 2006 semester Firefighter I class achieved a 90% pass rate on the Firefighter Certification test. Larry Pander, Fire Science program leader and instructor, is a Garden City Fire Department volunteer firefighter, serves as the GCFD Training Manager (through Kansas Fire and Rescue Training Institute, KU), and is Chairman of the GCFD 's Employee Advisory Committee. Larry is also working closely with the city to initiate live fire training through the establishment of a Fire Tower.

A package of **promotional materials for the GCCC Endowment Association Scholarship Auction** earned special notice in the January 2007 edition of a national graphic design magazine, Liquid Library. The series included promotional posters, catalogs, mailers, tickets and other printed materials, as well as a web page design, for the 2006 auction, entitled "Spring It On." The items were featured as national examples by Dynamic Graphics, a major world supplier of graphic arts images, based in Peoria, Ill. GCCC Graphic and Web Page Designer Tiffany Heit earned a certificate of excellence for outstanding graphic design in connection with the materials. The printed items were produced in-house by GCCC Printing Services. In addition to the GCCC items, the magazine also featured designs for a promotional postcard from Midway Baptist Church in San Diego, Calif.; an information insert from Porath Print Source in Cleveland, Ohio; and a conference agenda from Desjardins General Insurance Group in Levis, Quebec, Canada. GCCC has also earned a series of regional and national graphic design awards from the National Council for Marketing and Public Relations.

Student Activities Committee hosted a Ping-Pong Tournament on January 11th and had 11 entries; Blake Baird won and received a \$25 gift certificate from the Chamber. An Ice Cream Social was held on January 25th and had 97 visitors. A Pool Tournament was also held on January 25th and had 14 entries; Tim Brown won and received a \$25 gift certificate from the Chamber.

Student Government Association hosted Bowl-Mania @ Hard Rock Lanes on January 18; 152 students bowled.

Residential Life has **204 residents** for the spring. We will be able to offer private rooms to those who requested them; there is a \$300 per semester extra charge for the private rooms. We got 18 new residents---of those 2 returned after they already checked out in the fall.

The residential life students have started their own **Bible Study**- It has met two times on Wednesday afternoons from 4-5 p.m. with good attendance.

An **acoustic guitar jam session** was held in the Theatre of the BTSC. It was attended by several residence hall students and the talk of more sessions is in the works.

We had 80+ participate in the **Super Bowl Food night**. Every resident was issued a coupon for FREE FOOD in the Snack Bar. It was hopping from 7-10 p.m. with quesadillas, hamburgers and cheeseburgers, spicy chicken sandwiches, lots of fries and pop.

The next big event for Residential Life will be the **Formal Steak night** in the Cafeteria on March 6. This is dinner with all the trimmings starting with the appropriate dinner attire---this year it is leis and hats, drinks (NABS), hors d'oeuvres in the Endowment Room, and dinner served to you after you are seated at your table by the host and hostess. Dessert follows in the Portico with, you guessed it---chocolate fountains. Mark you calendars for lots of food and fun that night, "Hawaiian Style." We are always looking for help to serve the students. We are not as young as when we started this over ten years ago so we need all the help we can get. Volunteers welcome---we pay with food or just come and eat with the students

January was an exciting month for the Kansas **Small Business Development Center** (KSBDC) statewide. Governor Kathleen Sebelius included a recommendation in her proposed budget for an additional \$1 million in funding for the KSBDC program. This would be the first state increase in nearly 20 years. The increased funding would be used in a variety of ways including adding nine new consultants across the state. The GCCC KSBDC would greatly benefit from that kind of addition to our ability to serve clients in 22 counties. It will increase our efficiency and our ability to see more people and in a timelier manner. We met with all of our legislators in Topeka on January 24 and had a positive response from them. Overall, they seem to be very supportive of the initiative.

In addition to our meetings with legislators, the Director attended the Kansas Workforce Summit, the Kansas Main Street Economic Restructuring Training meeting, the Kansas Bioscience Forum and assisted with interviews for the FHSU KSBDC office Administrative Business Specialist position. The Assistant Director also attended the USDA Energy Conference. These meetings bring a lot of excellent information for us to share with clients and build a strong program.

Marty Sigwing, Director of Physical Plant, began working January 22. He has already made progress by executing a new procedure to streamline the work order process. There are a few details to work out, but progress is being seen across campus.

The **Chiller Plant's "free-cooling" system** (utilizing the outdoor cold air to provide the cooling for the campus's cooling needs) has been implemented. This is the first time the system has been used

since it was installed last summer. The system is performing very well. There should be some substantial energy savings since the chillers are not being operated.

The installation of the **domestic hot water heat exchanger system in DPAC** is nearly complete by Tatro Plumbing; only punch list items remain; piping for the heating project has been delivered to the site. The final four repaired baseball light poles have been delivered back to the college; as soon as the lights are painted, the poles will be wired and mounted.

The mailroom posted **8,062 pieces of mail** during January. Bulk mail was processed for B & I, Admissions, Music, Adult Learning Center, Newspaper and CECS. The switchboard received **3,618 calls** this past month.

The print shop printed **over 64,000 impressions** during the first week of the semester. Items printed include student activities posters, Southwest Music Academy brochures, employee business cards, admissions flyers and brochures, student manuals for Public Safety, CNA and Med Aide courses. Over 218, 000 black impressions and 16,500 impressions were completed. Over 795 copy center requests were completed as well as over 100 printing requests.

The **remodeling of the old Administration Building** continues with the completion of the Endowment Offices.

The **Payroll Office** printed and distributed 888 Form W-2 with a total gross wages of \$10,187,048.18. The Business Office and the IT Department worked together to develop a procedure to merge vendors as well as process 3,851 Form 1098T for students and 88 Form 1099 for vendors.

The **purchase card pilot group** received training and their GCCC VISA cards were distributed. The first statement cycle has ended and Lucy Martinez, Accounts Payable Coordinator, received training on the on-line statement process. Each month more staff will receive training and VISA cards.

The Business Office, along with Student Services, expanded the **evening registration** for the Spring Semester. The offices increased their night coverage to include the Tuesday evening before the first day of classes. Over 80 students were served during the evening hours.

The Business Office is working with Financial Aid to set up **Electronic Funds Transfer** from Commerce Bank for financial aid for the Spring 07 semester.

The **IT Department** completed KSPSD reports and created front end screens for the reports. School Maestro software was moved to a new server and 17 laptops were set up for CECS. Installation began for the Network Access Control System. IT assisted the Maintenance Department in setting up new offices and relocating offices during remodeling.

Counseling/Advising news for the past month included:

Martin Luther King, Jr. assembly had over 400 students, staff, faculty and community in attendance. In addition, the Black Student Union and Student Government collaborated with Chartwells to provide a meal following the assembly. Over 160 people attended the luncheon.

■ Wichita State University advising/information meeting was held on campus Feb. 7. Over 70 students and parents were in attendance. The meeting was scheduled to assist students in the transfer process to Wichita State and insure that all paperwork was in place prior to transferring.

Admissions news of the past month included:

- set up an information table at the High Plains League High School Basketball tournament and spoke with over 200 people from around SW Kansas. A table was also set up at the Santa Fe Trail League High School tournament. More than 20 faculty and staff volunteers manned the tables. 17 campus groups donated promotional items as well!
- hosted 47 Lakin Middle School 6th graders and 5 sponsors on Feb 6 for a technical career day. They visited the Criminal Justice, John Deere AgTech, Ammonia Refrigeration/Electronics, Cosmetology, Child Care and Nursing Departments. Their day ended with a tour of a dorm room and many 'Thank Yous!!"
- hosted a Pizza Party at the Bryan Education Center in Scott City for 7 Scott Community High School seniors and 7 parents. 8 faculty and staff also attended and spent the evening visiting with our guests and answering questions.
- made high school visits to the ESL seniors class at GCHS and the Alternative High School in GC.
- welcomed 34 students for individual campus tours

Garden City Community College just received a **five-year**, **\$75,000 gift from Cox Communications** to establish the Cox Communications Media Center, where students will receive hands-on experience in radio and television broadcasting.

East Coast jazz saxophone performer, composer and arranger Rick Hirsch has confirmed plans to headline the 2007 **Garden City Jazz Festival March 5** at Garden City Community College, hosted by GCCC and the Garden City Telegram.

Incidental Information GCCC Board of Trustees March 2007

The **Physical Plant** continues to make progress on outstanding work orders and remodeling projects. Darla's office has been painted and carpeted. The area that will become the office of Institutional Research is currently being updated. There are a few finishing touches and this project will be complete.

Work has begun at the **Dennis Perryman Athletic Complex**. The installation of the new washer and dryer is complete. A chemical feeder will be installed on the washer in order to fully automate washing cycles. The old window air conditioner units previously installed in the walls of the offices at DPAC have been removed and the holes have been patched. Remodeling of the women's locker rooms will begin shortly. The installation of the domestic hot water heat exchanger system in DPAC is complete.

The **final four stadium lights at Williams Stadium** have been painted; the poles are being wired and will soon be back in place.

The **Grounds Department** has done a remarkable job this winter with snow and ice removal. When time allows, Mike Cruz and his crew have assisted the Maintenance Department with work orders. Thanks to the Grounds Department's efficient snow removal, twice a day mail and package delivery continued through out the bad weather

Emergency repairs were made on the **Fine Arts Auditorium stage lift** for the recent production.

It has been a very busy month for **Central Services**. The mailroom posted 8,475 pieces of mail this past month, for a total of \$3,726.33 in first class postage. Bulk mail was processed for football and the student newspaper. Monthly phone call count was 2,778 calls received. The switchboard received 441 calls the day evening classes were cancelled due to snow. That same evening, an additional 359 calls where received.

The **Copy Center** completed over 450 copy center orders and 75 printing requests. Items printed for the 2007 Rodeo include tickets, programs, flyers, posters and performance slack sheets. For the drama production of "Marty", postcards, posters, tickets and programs were printed. Additional print requests included football and baseball recruiting materials, piano festival postcards and certificates, financial aid scholarship certificates, admissions flyers and registrar student directories. One hundred nursing program recruiting DVDs were copied.

The **Business Office** processed and distributed 509 financial aid disbursement checks for a total of \$363,736.22. The first electronic receipt of funds occurred during this disbursement. A total of \$75,814.00 in student loans for 77 students eliminated the handling of paper checks. Electronic transmission will be expanded to other lenders this fall.

Additional training was received on the **Fixed Assets software and data entry input of assets** began. The Business Office staff prepared for the upcoming GCCC Rodeo. Business Office personnel work the rodeo by collecting entry fees and preparing the award checks for rodeo participants.

The first cycle of the **GCCC Purchase Card process** has been completed and the Business Office staff received training on downloading the monthly statement. Eight employees received college purchase cards and have participated in the pilot group. After working through a few challenges, revisions were made to the procedures and guidelines. Overall, the process has run quite smooth. The test group will be expanded by ten people this next month. Craig Wheeler from Commerce Bank facilitates the training sessions which are mandatory before an employee is issued a college credit card.

The IT Department assisted the Business Office in the **electronic archiving of cash receipts and daily cash journals.** This process will allow the Business Office to electronically store these documents for the auditors thereby eliminating the need to print and store the documents. This is another step towards reducing the amount of paper generated on campus and will free up valuable file space.

The IT Department completed the **hardware upgrade** for the GCCC web page and the hardware upgrade for the Exchange Server.

LEOTI COMMUNITY SHARES NEEDS AND IDEAS WITH GCCC

College personnel seek ways to provide better service throughout area

While the turnout wasn't large, people in the Leoti community provided a wealth of ideas and suggestions when Garden City Community College recently hosted a public meeting to gather input.

The gathering included Dr. Carol Ballantyne, GCCC president, and other college staff members interested in learning how effectively the college is serving the Wichita County area. The group also focused on what services might be added for the community.

"One of the things I really wanted to find out was how GCCC might serve the people of Leoti better in terms of developing future employees, providing in-service training for current employees, and addressing civic needs," Ballantyne said.

"I was also interested in exploring the concept of stronger partnerships with local schools, businesses and agencies," the president added, "as well as transfer preparation for college students."

IDEAS FOR NEW OPPORTUNITIES

Among new learning opportunities the college was asked to consider were adult education courses and computer training, as well as programs that could enhance employment opportunities.

The discussion touched on computer lab access at the public library, as well as programs or services that could be offered in connection with the CARE Center, senior citizen center, Leoti High School, and recreation center. GCCC also noted a potential desire for center citizen computer training, somewhat like the college now offers on the main campus in Garden City.

The need for stronger English-Spanish communication learning also emerged, with college personnel outlining the nationally recognized Command Spanish Program provided through the GCCC Business and Industry Institute, as well as the possibility of courses in basic conversational Spanish and English as a Second Language.

Other ideas ranged for technical learning directed at development of key trade skills to the possibility of Work Study Program expansion and new links with the community's high school students.

In terms of serving workforce, business and economic development needs, the Feb. 22 discussion also addressed ways to coordinate with ADM, Sea Board Farms and other specific industries. In addition, college personnel explained opportunities such as American Management Association short-term certificate program courses, and computer application classes covering everything from the QuickBooks home and business bookkeeping program to the Microsoft Office suite for word processing, bookkeeping and spreadsheet functions.

In addition, ideas for new or expanded programs and connections included:

- Teleconferencing
- Continuing education credit classes for insurance agent licensure and relicensure
- Use of business mailing lists and e-mail contacts to share information on opportunities
- Possible recreational services.

VALUE OF PRESENT SERVICES

In addressing what the college is effectively providing now in the Leoti area, particularly in terms of helping meet community goals, GCCC was noted for:

• Providing credit classes to college-bound local students.

• Helping bring greater bachelor degree opportunities to the area through partnership programs with various universities, as well as the AccessUS consortium of universities and community colleges.

• Making Scott City's Bryan Education Center services available to people in the Leoti area.

• Providing recreation-oriented community courses in past years.

• Offering a range of hometown college classes in the evenings through the GCCC Outreach Program.

AREAS YET TO REACH

"We also wanted to know specifically what segments of the Leoti community that we're not necessarily reaching or serving right now," said Nancy Harness, dean of continuing education and community services.

Responses to that question ranged from greater programs for the area's Hispanic residents to services for major employers, such as Seaboard. One possible solution, Harness noted, would be to survey needs and determine how those could be met.

21ST CENTURY TECHNICAL NEEDS

The college also asked what vocational, occupational or technical programs the Leoti area may need over the next five years. Responses ranged Certified Nurse Aid training and recertification to expanded links to Scott City's Bryan Center.

They also included summer season courses for high school students, additional computer training, vocational trade and industrial arts classes, such as electricity, construction, plumbing, appliance and computer service. Among other suggestions were certified training in truck driving and 21st Century automotive repair and service, possibly involving internship programs.

The discussion also touched on the possibility of a municipal role in paying partial tuition, depending on needs.

CONTINUING INPUT

"This was really a listening visit," said Clayton Tatro, dean of learning services. Wichita County is part of GCCC's assigned credit service area, and Leoti is a GCCC Outreach Program site.

College personnel have launched a new effort to visit communities throughout the college service area, covering several per year in an effort to assess needs and perceptions.

Dear Carol,

What a great article in the Telegram on January 24. You are to be commended for continuing to broaden the horizons of our Community and our Community College. I just want to support your notions and directions of thought.

I remember; first as a Trustee and then later as the Dean of Technical Instruction, the many hours I spent discussing with people, both in the community and on the campus, the importance of being a truly Comprehensive Community's Learning Center, and not just a juco. The old "JUCO" thing just needed to be put to rest. And it still does. At least that was always my position. I believed the College needed to have more than just a few token 1960s based vocational programs to be responsive to both our Community's total educational needs of a post secondary nature, and our emerging retraining needs. I did recognize the difference between Vocational programs and Technical Programs and tried to focus any new program development in a Technical vein.

Carol, I also recognized the importance of a strong Academic programs or majors. Although distance learning have made a difference, there is still a need for raw and traditional in house instruction. I just don't think we can, even given our current technically based educational delivery systems, replace the here and now, present and human element in teaching. Full time faculty are so important. Expensive..., but important.

Of course, during my time in office, and during my time in a leadership position......I knew that funding was dependent on credit hour production. That is the reason I set the programs we developed during my turn at bat to be credit hour based. You probably are not surprised to learn that I caught considerable flack from both the academic and technical communities about setting the Ammonia and the John Deere program in credit hours. After all, I was told by both groups that Voc or Tech courses were not of an academic nature. Just time based and not yet competency based. I also believed strongly that we needed to set the Ammonia program in a seminar mode to be more useful to prospective participating companies. GCCC PERCEPTION STUDY PREVIEW January-March, 2007 Selected preliminary results

This report is a preview. It includes manually tabulated results from 12 of 26 single and multiple-part questions asked during the Garden City Community College Education Research Council's telephonic survey of the seven-county GCCC credit service area. The survey took place using Commerce Bank telephones over five evenings in January and February, 2007. The final report, employing principles attained by the GCCC team in on-campus training conducted by The Research Partnership, Inc., of Wichita, will include results from all 26 questions, incorporating analysis obtained by use of SPSS software.

The survey is based on 301 completed responses, drawn on approximately 1,200 calls, with a random sampling error of 5.2 percent.

General Outline of Survey

Overall Goal and Objectives:

The overall goal of the research is to gain the general public's perception of Garden City Community College (GCCC). Specific objectives to reach the overall goal include.

• To obtain aided and unaided awareness of GCCC.

•To obtain top of mind perceptions of GCCC, which will include any positives or negatives?

• To explore if there is a perceived difference between a community college and junior college, and if so, what is GCCC perceived to be.

• To ascertain the **awareness**, **use** and planned **future use** of the following GCCC programs and services:

- a. Business training.
- b. Technical training.
- c. Higher education.
- d. Cultural activities (e.g. plays and concerts).
- e. Youth activities.
- f. Athletic activities.
- g. Outreach programs/duel credit.
- h. Enrichment classes.
- i. The campus in general.

• To determine what **new** programs/services GCCC should offer that are not currently being offered.

• To explore the importance of GCCC to the community.

• To obtain advertising recall for institutions of higher education. This will include probing on:

- a. what advertisements are recalled.
- b. where were the advertisements seen or heard (e.g. radio, television, billboard, etc.).
- c. where consumers would like to obtain information regarding GCCC.
- To provide a demographic profile of those participating in the research.

Methodology:

- 1. A telephone survey administered to a sufficient sample of individuals who live in the credit service area of GCCC to yield 300 completions. The maximum margin of error is + or -5.2% at the 95% confidence level.
- 2. Individuals participating in the survey met the following screening criteria:
 - a. Must be 16 years of age or older.
 - b. Must live in the credit service area for GCCC for one year or longer.
 - c. Individuals or their family members cannot currently work in market research, advertising or in higher education (e.g. a community college or university).

Finney, Greeley, Hamilton, Kearny, Lane, Scott and Wichita Counties.

Attached is the Garden City Community College Vehicle Report for the time period of July 1st, 2006 through December 31st, 2006. Included in this report are the transportation buses, mini busses, cars, trucks, mini vans, utility vans, motorcycles, trailers, and ambulance.

I would like to point out that several fields of data have not been included in this specific report such as *vehicle maintenance costs*, *fuel usage*, and *mileage since last report*. A large portion of this data was missing or was not recorded for this time period and could not be considered reliable.

In response to this issue, new recordkeeping procedures and vehicle usage guidelines were introduced in the physical plant business office beginning January 1st, 2007. Drivers, fuel, distances, and maintenance costs are now recorded for future reporting. A second report will be submitted in August 2007 that will cover the time period of Jan 1st, 2007 to June 30th, 2007, and will contain the missing data for the respective time period.

There was only one reported accident for this time period which occurred in December. Car #51 was hit by another vehicle. Fortunately there were no injuries and the repair costs to the college vehicle were only \$1190.82.

There are no recommendations at the time of this report to purchase or sell any of the vehicles or trailers. To be included in the Jan 1st, 2007 to June 30, 2007 report, will be a full evaluation of the vehicle inventory with recommendations.
