CALL TO ORDER:

Chair Wasinger called the regular board meeting to order at 6:02 p.m.

COMMENTS FROM THE CHAIR:

Chair Wasinger made the following comments:

- Chair Wasinger congratulated the 2019 GCCC Meats Team and Dr. Clint Alexander in their historic win at the Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo Meats Contest. This was the first time in program history that GCCC has won this contest.
- Congratulations were extended to Azat Jumadurdyyey (Economics and Finance Major) and Clara Jackson (Biology and Physician's Assistant Major) two GCCC Students that were honored at the March 7 Phi Theta Kappa/Annual All-Kansas Academic Team Luncheon in Topeka. Both students received a medal, certificate, \$300 stipend, and \$1,000 scholarship to be applied toward their education at one of the six Regents Universities. Washburn, or several private colleges in Kansas.
- Chair Wasinger took a few minutes to express his gratitude to GCCC Custodial and Grounds crew for all their work during the recent snow falls. Derek Ramos, Dean of Facilities and his crew work hard to keep parking lots and sidewalks safe for all of us at GCCC! Their hard work is appreciated.

President Ruda welcomed GCCC employee Munoz and presented her with a GCCC Broncbuster lapel pin.

REPORT FROM STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION:

Due to spring break no report was given by Student Government Association.

REPORT FROM FACULTY SENATE:

Phil Hoke, Drama Instructor/Faculty Senate, began his report by thanking President Ruda and Chairman Wasinger for making time to meet informally with himself and Larry Jenkins, Senate Representative recently. Hoke felt that the meeting went well and that ideas and a good line of communication has been established.

Faculty Senate continues review of policies and Senate Bylaws. Hoke went on to share that Nicole Dick and Perla Salazar were re-elected to Faculty Senate, and Brian McCallum will serve as alternate for 2019-2020 and be seated as a full Senator for the 2020-2021 Senate. Professional development funds have been approved for Fire Science Instructor, Larry Pander to attend a conference. Senate is reviewing professional development procedures to insure the process is fair to all that apply.

Hoke expressed appreciation to President Ruda for hosting building lunches. Hoke invited Trustees to attend the Garden City Community College Campus Quiz Bowl on April 4 and to save the date of April 26 for the annual faculty luncheon. Faculty Senate is working with Registrar, Nancy Unruh, on commencement plans.

Trustees thanked Hoke for his report.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

This portion of the meeting is related to student accomplishments, activities, campus visitors, and special events that have taken place in the GCCC campus community since the last Board of Trustee meeting.

Campus Events

TRIO Day—February 25

President Ruda reported that the TRIO Student Support Services program celebrated the 26th Annual National TRIO Day in February with ice cream and cake in the Saffell Library. TRIO Day is a day of celebration, reflection, and action focused around increased access to higher education for disadvantaged students. Federal TRIO programs help low-income and first-generation students enter college and earn a college degree.

The SSS program at GCCC submitted its 2017-2018 Annual Performance Report to the US Department of Education last week. In that year, 95% of program participants were in good academic standing where the goal was 81%. Regarding persistence, 88% of students continued from one academic year to the next compared to the 67% goal.

Sixty-three individuals joined SSS to celebrate National TRIO Day, many of whom had the chance to answer trivia questions about the program. The golden balloons used to celebrate the occasion also served a second purpose. After the celebration, the balloons were delivered to the children and families at St. Catherine's hospital in order to spread a little joy for those struggling with illness and to fulfill the long-standing tradition of conducting service projects on TRIO Day.

Matrix Interactive Day @ GCCC Cosmetology—March 5

The Cosmetology School frequently offers unique educational experiences to students by welcoming product experts from various beauty brands to demonstrate new products or discuss new trends. This month, a team from SalonCentric and Matrix came to GCCC for Matrix Interactive Day. In addition to benefitting students, Alumni of GCCC Cosmetology and local beauty professionals were invited back to GCCC for this free training, information, and demonstration.

Choral Valentine's Concert—February 14

The Department of Music held the annual Choral Valentine's Concert in the Pauline Joyce Fine Arts Auditorium. The Concert Choir, the College Singers, and several student soloists performed under the direction of Vocal Music Director and Instructor, Clay Wright. Joe Lowery and Ron Carlson accompanied the students on the piano and the flute.

Death Trap Dinner Theatre—February 28/March 1

President Ruda shared that despite a forced rescheduling and the ultimate cancelation of a few shows, the Death Trap Dinner Theatre was successful for two nights of great food and a thrilling performance by the College Players. All proceeds for this event will be used to send students to the Kennedy Center for American College Theatre Festival in Sioux Falls next year.

Pondering the Prairie Substrate—February through March; Demonstration March 1

The Mercer Gallery hosted Mixed Media Artist, Ron Michael, for an exhibition and demonstrations in the art studio. "Pondering the Prairie Substrate" was on display for the full month of February, and Michael conducted a demonstration on March 1, highlighting slow art movement and frugal making practices. The Gallery celebrated the exhibit and Michael's work with a First Friday reception, including music from GCCC's Faculty Jazz Ensemble.

Employee Appreciation—March 1

The newly formed Human Resources team of Kellee Munoz and Alexis Saenz delivered bags of Tootsie Rolls to all employees to thank each employee for the "roll" they each play on the campus. The HR department invited Employees to a reception with cake, cookies, and refreshments held outside of the newly redecorated North end of the SCSC building.

Ron Carlson speaks to Rotary—February 13

Physics and Computer Science Instructor, Ron Carlson, gave a presentation to the Garden City Rotary Club on February 13 about increasing opportunities for employment in the Computer Science field and the courses and offerings at GCCC to help meet the workforce need.

Lakin Futures—February 22

Lakin Middle School students toured GCCC campus and programs on Friday, February 22. These future Busters visited GCCC technical programs; including Automotive, Criminal Justice, EMS Fire Science, John Deere, Cosmetology, and GC3 Media. We enjoy having future Busters visit us.

Healthcare Career Fair—March 1

The Nursing and Allied Health Departments hosted the Annual Healthcare Career Fair. The fair brings in local employers in the healthcare field as well as employers and educational institutions from around the state. Fields represented often include dietary, housekeeping, maintenance, clerical, and therapy. Local job-seekers, students

across the GCCC campus, and the students enrolled in C.N.A., Nursing, and Allied Health programs at GCCC attend this function each year.

Chamber of Commerce Banquet—March 7

Eight administrators represented the college at the Garden City Area Chamber of Commerce Annual Banquet on March 7. The highlight of the evening came when GCCC's own Beth Tedrow was named the 2018 Award of Merit Recipient. GCCC was mentioned numerous times as Beth was introduced before the banquet attendees. GCCC's auction item/banquet table centerpiece won 2nd place in the table decorating contest and, in true Broncbuster fashion, Beth was the highest bidder and won The Busters Yellow Submarine Centerpiece, filled with college apparel and gear.

Accomplishments and New Initiatives

Intercollegiate Band—February 22

The Garden City Community College Department of Music is proud to recognize five band students who performed with the Kansas Intercollegiate Band during the Kansas Music Educator's Conference, which was held in Wichita on February 22. Emmanuel Ornelas (Ulysses, KS) – trumpet, Adrian DeLeon (Garden City, KS) – trumpet, Max Giesaking (Ulysses, KS) – trombone, Colten May (Garden City, KS) – euphonium, and Jared Berry (Garden City, KS) – percussion each had the opportunity to audition and were accepted into the exclusive ensemble. The Intercollegiate Band, which is comprised of a select group of students from public and private two and four-year colleges from the state of Kansas, only performs every two years during the conference.

With five accepted student musicians participating, GCCC had the largest student representation in the ensemble of any community college in the state. These GCCC representatives and other participants were under the direction of guest clinician, Dr. Christopher Chapman, Director of Bands at Oregon State University, for a full day and a half of practice and preparation. The culminating performance was ultimately held at the Century II Convention Center in downtown Wichita.

Meat Judging at Houston—March 1

The 2019 Garden City Community College Meats Team made history in February by winning the Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo Intercollegiate Meats Contest for the first time in program history. GCCC Meats Judging teams have placed 2nd in the contest nine times since 2000, but had not been able to secure the win, until now.

Students Honored

Alpha Xi Upsilon, Garden City Community College's Chapter of the Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) society, honored student members Azat Jumadurdyyev and Clara Jackson with a medal, certificate, and a \$300 stipend at the All-Kansas Academic Team luncheon on March 7. The honor also guarantees both Jackson and Jumadurdyyev a minimum of a \$1000 scholarship to be applied toward their education at one of the six Regents Universities, Washburn University, or one of several private colleges in Kansas.

Rvan Ruda, President/Vice President for Instruction:

Technical Education and Workforce Development

The Tech Ed division is focused on finishing the current semester while looking ahead to next year, already. Recruitment of new students is a critical piece to the role of an instructor in the Tech Ed division, and our current staff works hard on a daily basis to promote and market each of their programs to all prospective students and parents. The Advisory Council meetings are coming to a close. They have been very successful this year, as a record number of attendees have been involved with the programs.

Here are some of the other major highlights from Tech Ed and Workforce Development:

Technical Education:

- John Deere
 - There are currently 17 new students under contract for next fall. This is ahead of recent numbers at this time in the semester.
 - o Faculty have participated in recruiting events in eastern Colorado and western Kansas.
 - o The American Implement GCCC Tech Program "commercial" is now available on Facebook and other social media outlets.
 - o John Deere graduation ceremony is set for Friday, May 2 at 12:00pm at Samy's Restaurant.

• Fire Science

- O The College is working collaboratively with Colby Community College, Seward County Community College, Dodge City Community College, and NW Tech College on an MOU that would arrange for GCCC to provide all Fire Science classes to these colleges and communities. GCCC is currently the only Fire Science AAS program in the western half of the state and has an opportunity to partner with a variety of other communities to provide certified fire personnel.
- O At the current time, the GCCC Fire Science program is partnering with at least 4-5 counties to provide FF-1 and Haz-Mat classes to local citizens.
- Agriculture/Animal Science/Rodeo
 - o Faculty are attempting to visit every high school within the SW District of FFA to recruit and share information regarding the Production Ag program at GCCC.
 - o The 52nd Annual GCCC College Rodeo will be held April 5-7.
 - o GCCC will be hosting the Meat and Food Science contest on April 17. This event will bring over 100 high school students to campus.

Transportation:

- March was a busy month with many Track, Baseball and Softball trips, unfortunately several of the Baseball and Softball trips had to be postponed due to weather conditions. Most of these trips will be rescheduled in April.
- March was also a rough month mechanically for our fleet.
 - o Minivan #63 was damaged while parked in a garage in Biloxi MS, estimates for repair are \$1,500 to \$4,500.
 - o Bus #1 has a persistent slow coolant leak, we have replaced a cracked radiator hose, bad drain valve and leaking coolant level sight glass, and still there is a loss of coolant. It will be in for additional repair the week of April 1st. Bus #1 also has an electrical problem where the front panel master switch will not cause the engine to turn off, the rear compartment service switch is still functional so the bus is still usable but it is awkward for the driver to open the rear compartment to shut down the bus. This has happened before and the cause was a defective master switch and possibly a bad multiplexer gateway. I have ordered a replacement switch and will replace it. We have a replacement gateway module if the switch is not the cause of the problem.
 - o The Meats refrigerated truck had to be towed in for repair, with the symptoms being no oil pressure and several engine waring indicators it was not prudent to attempt to drive it in. We suspect at a minimum that the oil pressure sending unit is bad, it also has a problem with the fuel distribution rail seals allowing fuel to drain back from the engine causing hard starting.
